# General Updates

- Tier 2 Status announced on September 15

	Higher Risk → Lower Risk of Community Disease Transmission			
	Widespread Tier 1	Substantial Tier 2	Moderate Tier 3	Minimal Tier 4
Measures*				
New cases**/100,000 population per day (7 day average; 7 day lag)	>7	4-7	1-3.9	<1
Testing % Positivity (7 day average; 7 day lag)	> 8%	5-8%	2-4.9%	<2%

# Discussion of Tiers

- **Tier 1 Purple, Widespread:** Most schools are closed to in-person learning instruction, unless they meet certain conditions
- **Tier 2 Red, Substantial:** Schools can reopen for in-person instruction after they have remained in the red tier for 14 days.
- **Tier 3 Orange, Moderate:** Schools can reopen for in-person instruction based on state and county guidance.
- **Tier 2 Yellow, Minimal:** Schools can re-open for in-person instruction based on county and state guidance.

County risk level	New cases	Positive tests
<b>WIDESPREAD</b> Most schools are closed to in-person instruction, unless they meet certain conditions	<b>More than 7</b> daily new cases (per 100k)	<b>More than 8%</b> positive tests
<b>SUBSTANTIAL</b> Schools can reopen for in-person instruction after they have remained in the red tier for 14 days	<b>4 - 7</b> daily new cases (per 100k)	<b>5 - 8%</b> positive tests
<b>MODERATE</b> Schools can reopen for in-person instruction based on state and county guidance	<b>1 - 3.9</b> daily new cases (per 100k)	<b>2 - 4.9%</b> positive tests
<b>MINIMAL</b> Schools can reopen for in-person instruction based on state and county guidance	<b>Less than 1</b> daily new cases (per 100k)	<b>Less than 2%</b> positive tests

# Announcement

- Per state regulations, Tier 2 counties that maintain Tier 2 data for at least 14 consecutive days may reopen schools to modified classroom-based learning. For Marin, that could be as early as September 29. **Mill Valley School District has made the decision to resume in-person instruction for students in grades K-5 in cohorts on October 12, 2020. Distance learning will continue for grades 6-8. Remote learning will be available for all K-5 students who opt in.**

# Safety Requirements for In-Person Learning



- Face coverings are required to be worn properly at all times by all individuals on our school sites, indoors or outdoors.
- Students and Staff shall fill out a checklist daily for symptoms associated with COVID-19 infection prior to entering school buildings.
- Physical distancing up to 6 feet will be implemented in classrooms.





# K-5 Hybrid Program Considerations

- Logistics: transition from distance to in-person learning
- Key cohort building factors
  - Planning for siblings
  - Specialist lessons (PE, Music, Art, and Library)
  - Intervention supports including RAMP, ELL and Special Education Services
- Ingress and egress points
- Mask protocols, hand washing and student training
- Other safety considerations (hallway access, visitor monitoring, etc.)

## 6-8 Transition Factors from Distance Learning to Hybrid

- The health and safety of students and staff is our top priority
- MVMS has 945 total students - a hybrid model would still bring about 500 students and 95 staff to campus for each shift in a hybrid model
- We have multiple cohorts and teachers that make it impossible to keep pure cohorts together without completely tracking students and changing schedules

Distance Learning	Hybrid Model Learning
<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>→ 160 synchronous minutes with teacher engagement (per class)</li><li>→ Flexible small group activities and breakout sessions</li><li>→ 1:1 teacher support in breakout rooms while students engage in activities</li><li>→ Teachers can view student work and have private conversations</li></ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>→ 80 synchronous minutes of teacher engagement (per class)</li><li>→ Small group activity and discussion (based on physical distancing limitations)</li><li>→ 1:1 interaction (with physical distancing limitations)</li><li>→ Viewing of student work and private conversation (with physical distancing limitations)</li></ul>

# Extended Remote Learning K-5

- ❖ Remote Learning Only K-5 Option begins Oct. 12th
- ❖ Teacher to student ratio 30 or <
- ❖ 1 District teacher per grade or combination class
- ❖ Instructional minutes SB 98 K-180, 1-3 230, 4-5 240
- ❖ Specials (art, music, PE) is remote and equivalent
- ❖ Sign up for up to full year remote learning by Sept. 23rd.- Parent Square
- ❖ Students and families receive parent square communications from their home schools
- ❖ Ensures your enrollment status at your home school when you return to in person learning
