<u>Administration Report</u> (see board packet for other administration reports):

- Superintendent Wharton reports out about the first week of school. She notes that there has been an increase in student enrollment and things are going smoothly. She also mentions that students are, "seizing the opportunity to go out for extracurricular activities."
- Strategic Plan: Wharton reports that it feels like the right time to revisit our district's Strategic Plan and proposes we start this process in the Spring. The district has launched several data collection systems and the data collected from these will assist in identifying priorities as we move forward. The board is supportive of this and reaching out to Walt Hanline to support the strategic plan process as he did in when we created the original plan.
- Wharton discusses the district's involvement with NWRESD/ODE alignment for student success process. This process includes a set of guidance that integrates six federal and state educational investments. The first guidance is in regards to community engagement, which Wharton regards as a positive as it allows us to reach out to more community stakeholders that we may have never considered in the past. NWRESD will support the district in writing the integrated guidance plan.
- OSBA Conference-Wharton goes over plan for several board members and administration to attend. Board members confirm their ability to attend.
- Wharton details a new health and wellness program for the staff. She lists several activities that will be offered to staff moving forward including afterschool classes (Zumba, Yoga) and time for staff to access the new walking trails on campus.
- Wharton is hoping that the next month's Board Meeting will be in the high school cafeteria. We are currently waiting on some technology.
- Policy work will begin in November.
- First football game on the new high school field will be on September 23rd.

<u>NVASI</u>: Director Stuart give NVASI update. We are currently in a "holding pattern." Superintendent Wharton will bring the MOA to the October Board Meeting to look over and discuss goals moving forward.

Notes from Nestucca High School

October 12, 2022

Recent Activities:

- Homecoming Week went pretty well:
 - O Cheer was joined by Nestucca alumni cheerleaders. The alumni cheered the first half of the game and then did their own dance at halftime. I think everyone enjoyed watching them, and our current cheerleaders were glad to meet them.
 - o The Homecoming Court rode around the track in Side by Sides, or Razors. Although we have always enjoyed seeing the old cars, we decided they would not be good on our new track. The side by sides drove on the outer area of the football field, staying off the track and the field itself. This seemed to work pretty well, as the kids liked riding in them, and they looked great! It was also great to see the enjoyment and enthusiasm the kids had when Diego Ponce and Lyndie Hurliman were crowned King and Queen.
- Cross Country is doing well in their conference. They will have their conference meet, or district meet, on Wednesday, October 19th.
- Both the volleyball and football teams have a good chance of making state playoffs. Watch Facebook, the Readerboard downtown and the morning announcements for information on, hopefully, both teams.
- Our Open House was more of a meet and greet atmosphere this year. We started out in the commons, with staff visiting with parents that came in. We offered a ParentVUE tutorial, a tour of the CTE building construction and a football/track tour. At the end of the night, we did a gift card drawing for Yellow Dog. Next year, we want to increase attendance and are already in the planning stages for that.
- Our Juntos Program is taking off this year. The students seem to be excited about the opportunities that come with that involvement. This is another way to get our students involved in activities and improve academics.
- We also have our Youth Re-engagement Program going this year, and several students have already made money! This is a program where a staff member from TBCC comes in and works with students who need to make up credits. This staff member helps keep track of classes and for every class they make up, the student earns \$50!
- Our Fall Play, How To Survive A Zombie Apocalypse, is going well and will be performed Friday and Saturday November 17th and 18th.

Upcoming Activities:

- We have a American Red Cross blood drive scheduled for November 1st. If you are willing to donate, please contact our office, or call Tevin at extension 120, and one of them will get you an appointment. As a heads up, if you sign up online ahead of time, it will save you waiting quite as long. Also, note that each time we meet a certain quota of units donated, one of our Seniors who is helping with the blood drive will receive a \$250 scholarship.
- We are starting our MAP testing tomorrow, and are grateful to have the trimester system with Advisory planned every day. We are able to schedule the entire school testing at the same time and not lose core academic class time. Obviously, we are also very fortunate to have enough computers in our building for every student to test with.
- We will have our Great American Shakeout on October 20th at 10:20 in the morning.
- A few of our Seniors will be attending the Cesar Chavez Leadership conference on October 28th....again, another way to get students involved in activities and increase academic performance.

Additional Notes:

• Although, we have all gone through too many changes these past couple of years, our students appear to have learned to be appreciative of what you have because it could literally be gone overnight. I am only stating this because I want the community, and you the board members, to know that we have tough kids...resilient kids, sometimes annoying kids, but kids we can be proud of and can have confidence in.

Board Meeting -10/12/22

- 1. After a few bumpy weeks, I am happy to report that our SPED programs are fully staffed! I am very excited about our new hires and look forward to our programs growing and thriving. Shout out to Ursula McVittie (HR) for tirelessly recruiting and supporting our program, as well as SPED staff for being patient and helping with the interview process.
- 2. Much like the rest of the district, we have been experiencing an increase in caseloads. Since the beginning to the year, we have increased our SPED number by almost 12, with many coming students coming from out of state. While this doesn't seem like a huge number, it is impactful on the small size of our programs.
- 3. We welcomed the district's very first service animal (a dog) to the K8 at the beginning of October. We had the trainers (who have been working with this dog and her owner for three years) come to the K8 and train on our students on how to appropriately interact with the service dog, as well as the student handler. So far, things have gone smoothly and the students have been applying what they learned from the trainers.
- 4. I have submitted our Title 1A and Title IIA (Reap) requirements and budget narratives. We are now waiting on approval of those narratives from ODE. Our focus for these funds are curriculum purchase K-12 and staffing.
- 5. Now that the pandemic requirements have lessened and students have returned to school, ODE is requiring that all special educations programs in the state must be audited. This process is related to the many unusual plans (abbreviated school days being one of the largest concerns) that were put in place due to major constraints during online learning for students with learning disabilities. The state is now wanting to confirm that FAPE (free and appropriate education) is being fully offered to all students. Fortunately, NVSD have remedied a lot of the temporary COVID plans and I believe our audit will go smoothly in December. We will also be engaging in the SPR&I process in order to identify any systemic issues within our practice.
- 6. I have met with our private school, Neskowin Valley, for the required consultation for both special education and Title 1A funding. Our district provides supports for private school students.

Board Report 10/12/2022

We have secured a water operator, Hiland Water, who will be assisting us with both the High School and K8 water system. They come highly recommended and will begin with us tomorrow.

We are fortunate to have good industry partner like Alliant Plumbing. Alliant is doing HVAC work for us at the high school. During the periodic maintenance Alliant identified that one of the pumps on our boiler system had failed. They were able to fix the pump and get the boiler in shape for heating season. They also identified a failure on a air handler that is fifty plus years old. Parts are no longer available for the system. However, they are able to have a part fabricated to get the system operational again. This is a huge savings versus replacing the equipment.

Also, you all know the track and fields are finished aside from a few minor punch list items. The track and football field are beautiful and among the best, if not the best, in the state. It is a real thrill to get to see them being used.

The new shop at the high school is on track for an on time opening. There has been significant progress made. The shell of the building is beginning to go up. If you have not seen it lately you really should.

The health care planning committee is moving along and has added some additional members. As we look at the data we are seeing some significant health care needs within our district community. More to come on this later.

Misty and I met with Under-Sheriff Matt Kelly last week about a possible South County substation at the K8. This meeting went very well and it looks like this may be a welcome reality for us soon. This is an exciting development.

We are enjoying getting to know our students and their families. A lot of time is being spent outside, learning and playing. Our teachers Ashlee Sears and Cindy Marshall are both working diligently with each students to establish goals around their current abilities and social – emotional needs. We have several students on an IFSP (Individual Family Service Plan- similar to an IEP in the K12 world), and a few in each classroom still working on their potty training. Our two Instructional Assistants, Natasha Durgan and Jackie Romero are wonderful supports to the teachers, greeting families each morning, cleaning the classrooms and hallways, and just ensuring that the students have everything they need to be successful.

Ashlee and I have participated in the MAP training, both from Heidi Schultz and the 2 hour training on October 7th. It has been a bit of a challenge to get our students in the system, but as soon as they are, we are ready to start with some Reading Fluency testing! While we aren't able to set our young students in front of a computer independently to do this work, we have borrowed 4 laptops and head sets, and hope to get at least 3 or 4 done each day, while also maintaining classroom coverage.

I have submitted the 2022/2023 Preschool Promise grant for the consortium. The budget was accepted last week, and classrooms are all up and running. If you have questions about this grant, let me know! I'm very proud of the work being done in early learning classrooms up in Tillamook and North County and enjoy working with the administrators and their staff. We are all going to be learning together next Friday October 21st, when a presenter from Teaching Preschool Partners will be helping us learn how to create developmentally appropriate classrooms, with an eye towards kindergarten readiness and social-emotional wellbeing. While I've invited this organization in, it is the NW Early Learning Hub that is paying for the day, including lunch for all!

October 20th, we will be participating (for the 10th year!) in the Great Oregon Shakeout, with an earthquake drill and an evacuation drill over to the fire house for a presentation from them in emergency preparedness. That afternoon, we are hosting a Pumpkin Party for all of our families from 3-5:00.

NESTUCCA VALLEY SCHOOL DISTRICT OCTOBER 12, 2022 REGULARLY SCHEDULED BOARD MEETING

ENROLLMENT-

Pre-K-34 K-8-352 High School -162

We are one of the few districts within the Northwest Region ESD service area that has seen an increase in enrollment. We are now larger than Gaston and Knappa.

BUDGET-

Today the district began a spending freeze, until November 21, 2022. This is out of extreme caution to get all things reconciled prior to entering into new budget creation. With personnel turnover at our CFO office, inflation, construction and increased enrollment we need to be proactive in how we approach spending the rest of the year. In order to be proactive, we need to reconcile all accounts and establish a new baseline.

PROGRAMMING-

PreK-12: We are in the process of gathering benchmarking academic data on every child in language arts, math and science. This will be very important as we work with each student to increase their academic growth. These tests offer far more information about students' needs then the state test and our educators will rely heavily on this data for goal writing and program planning.

STATE REPORT CARDS-

State report cards will be released on October 20. This year our district had a significant number of families opt their children out of testing. As such the number of our students passing the state test the last school year is much lower than any previous year. As a district we also did not place a great deal of focus on the test last year. We pushed our efforts into the health and well being of the students, and created new routines and systems coming out of COVID. I feel our MAP data will be a better representation of where students are academically.

DIVISION 22 STANDARDS-

This year as a result of so many students opting out of state testing, we did not meet the Division 22 standard around state assessment. This is reflected on our Division 22 Plan which will be shared with the community, and includes a detailed list of actions to be taken.

CTE FOUNDATION-

Some members of the CTE Foundation will be attending a national conference to learn from other programs around the state. Topics will range from: engaging students with disabilities into Career Tech Ed, aligning a K-12 system in CTE, developing successful partnership and much more. It is a three-day conference and Brian Hardebeck will be joining us so that as we can continue to drive forward the vision of CTE in the NVSD.

2021-22 AUDIT-

Today I received the 2021-2022 Auditors exit comments and will meet with them tomorrow to review findings, if there are any. This will be presented to the board at either our November or December meeting depending upon the auditor's availability.

Oregon School Activities Association (OSAA)-

Our district will begin the application process to be a participant in the OSAA STAR initiative. Here is a link with more information about what this means: https://www.osaa.org/docs/equity/OSAA%20S.T.A.R.%20Launch%20Press%20Release%20FINAL.pdf

This information can also be found in the back of the board packet. We have had divisive events occur at some of our athletic events, that would be in violation of the STAR initiative. We are not unique as a district, most districts in the state are facing

such challenges. It is my hope that by educating our community on how we conduct ourselves at events, will help make the environment one of positivity for our student athletes, contest officials, visiting teams and fellow community members.

Oregon School Activities Association Launches S.T.A.R. Initiative to Disrupt Racism and Combat Discrimination at Oregon High School Athletic Events

WILSONVILLE, ORE. — This Fall, the Oregon School Activities Association (OSAA) has launched S.T.A.R., a new initiative that provides a model for racial equity awareness, action, and resources on how to prepare for, educate and interrupt discriminatory behaviors occurring during high school sporting events. Standing for Safety, Tolerance, Acceptance and Respect, the S.T.A.R. initiative provides training and resources to help schools become more equity minded in events they host and eradicate discriminatory behaviors safely and respectfully.

"S.T.A.R. provides our athletic directors and coaches with tools to navigate discriminatory incidents that occur and puts a structure in place to support their actions," said Peter Weber, OSAA executive director. "We believe this program is going to set the bar for non-discrimination in Oregon high school sports and activities."

S.T.A.R. evolved in answer to Oregon House Bill (HB) 3409, which was passed and placed into effect in the fall of 2019 following years of incidents of cultural, racial and ethnic transgressions during state high school events. Sponsored by Oregon State Rep. Janelle Bynum, House Speaker Tina Kotek and House Majority Leader Barbara Smith Warner, HB 3409 stated that school districts can't be members of an interscholastic association unless that body has a process to sanction discriminatory behavior at events.

"We fought for HB 3409 because we believe that awareness and education will lead to the eradication of racial transgressions during high school events," said Rep. Bynum. "With the S.T.A.R. program, OSAA has developed a positive and supportive way to put HB 3409 into practice within the four walls of a school and on every field, course and court."

OSAA worked collaboratively with a number of state entities—including the Oregon Department of Education, the Coalition of Oregon School Administrators, the Oregon School Boards Association and the Oregon Association of Student Councils—as well as students, educators, and administrators on how to respond, create an action plan and move forward with the requirements of HB 3409.

"All students deserve the ability to compete in interscholastic events without feeling discriminated against or fearful of how we will be treated at an event," said Yosalin Arenas, a 2021 graduate of South Medford High School. "I'm hopeful that S.T.A.R. will help combat the racism and discrimination that students like myself have faced in the past."
