#### Special Programs-Kellow

#### Board Meeting 11/8/22

- 1. Like the rest of the district, SPED enrollment continues to increase. Students with SPED identifications represent 18 % of our total school population.
- 2. All federal Title program budgets were approved last week by ODE. As previously mentioned, these funds will be spent on staffing and curriculum.
- 3. SPR&I has officially been replaced by a new process called "Cyclical Monitoring." Every district in the state must participate and it is a three-year cycle. Nestucca has been selected for Cohort A, which means we are one of the first districts in the state to go through this rather intensive process. Of course, with all brand-new processes, there are some nerves associated with it, but we are fortunate to have a very knowledgeable ODE contact (that I have personally worked with for years) to support us through all this new information and requirements. I am hopeful that going through this process will help guide us to areas in which we can make improvements, as well as areas that we can celebrate a job well done!
- 4. I now am the Youth Transition Program (YTP) Director for all three school districts in Tillamook County. I am still very new to this, but have started work on creating new budgets (via our YTP consortium grant) to support our three programs for the next several years. I am very grateful to VR (Vocational Rehabilitation) in Tillamook, the YTP Management Team at U of O, ODE and NKN/TSD's financial department for their support as I learn. We continue to add students from NVSD to this program with the support of Autum Marsh (YTP Coordinator for our district) and I am excited the new services and opportunities we plan to provide to all students in Tillamook County.

#### 5. Upcoming work includes:

- a. ELL Fall collection for ODE which helps the state and district track ELL students, their progress in the program and what supports can be provided as they exit ELL and move into 4 years of monitoring status.
- b. SIA (student Investment Account Reporting)
- c. Integrated Guidance process
- d. CTE Conference at the end of the month to Learn about CTE as it relates to special education and how this can provide excellent opportunities for all students. I am very grateful to have the opportunity to learn more about this.
- e. Special Education Child Find-Our largest SPED collection of the year for ODE.

### NOTES FROM NESTUCCA HIGH SCHOOL

November 9, 2022

#### **Recent Activities:**

- The volleyball team made it to the first round of state playoffs; they lost to Stanfield, who is a 3A school playing down at the 2A level.
- Our football team also made it to state playoffs and lost to Umatilla 23-24, also a 3A school playing down at the 2A level.
- In Cross Country, Micah Riggs, who is a freshman, broke the school record at Districts and then broke it again at State, coming in 21st out of 107 runners!
- Our cheerleaders hosted a cheer camp for the younger students and they performed the first half of the last home game. It was a busy game, with it being Senior night for cheerleaders and football players, as well as youth cheerleader performances.
- The speech team did well at their last tournament. We have 10 students out for the team, led by Lionel Brown, who placed 2<sup>nd</sup> in Extemporaneous Speaking and 3<sup>rd</sup> in Impromptu.
- We have several clubs for students to join: Monday is Anime Club or National Oceanic Sciences Bowl,
   Wednesday is Gaming Club and Friday is Dungeons and Dragons Club.
- Last night was a fantastic performance by the high school choir and band. I think one of the crowd favorites was an Adelle medley, which brought a few of our students into a comfort zone I had not seen before. It was fantastic! We are also shorthanded in the band area for the pieces the students were playing, but thanks to the creativity by Kathleen Serven and the ability of a couple of our seniors, Rachel Gregory and Landon Flores (who played multiple instruments during one piece), it was very impressive.
- We were able to collect 37 units of blood on November 1<sup>st</sup> during the American Red Cross Blood Drive; that translates out to 111 lives saved! Thank you if you came up to donate. If you did not, don't worry. There will be another one in March!
- I have met with each senior who is credit deficient. Each one of them can make it with some work, and we have created a plan together for them to be successful.
- I have also met with each teacher to set their goals...this is the first time in a long time and it is long overdue.
- We completed our first round of MAP testing. I have to give a big shout out to my staff. We came up with a testing schedule, in hopes of not losing class periods, and in turn learning. We learned as we tested and we got most of them through most of the tests. We know exactly how to proceed and my staff was very patient and flexible and willing to do whatever was necessary. They are great to work with!

#### **Upcoming Activities:**

- Our Fall Play, *How To Survive A Zombie Apocalypse*, will be next Friday and Saturday November 17<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>. I know our students are greatly appreciative when anyone comes to watch them.
- Winter sports practice starts Monday. Boys basketball will be coached by Justin Hartford and Tanner Mannen. The girls will be coached by Tevin Gianella, Jeremy Strober and Josh Rist, and the wrestling team will be coached by Aaron Pearn and Johnny Pena.
- Our first trimester ends on December 2<sup>nd</sup>. This year is flying! As you can see from above, we have been busy. From here until January, the days just fly by; there are so many activities going on. If you ever want to come by during lunchtime and just visit with the kids, feel free to do so. I do ask that you sign in at the office and put a visitor sticker on. But come on in and sit down with the kids who are making a mess with grapes and BBQ sauce on their table in the cafeteria...but then clean it up and didn't waste food; it was a small mess. Or come shoot hoops with kids in the gym, but be careful because balls are flying everywhere...and no street shoes are allowed on the gym floor, by the way. Or sit in the commons with a few kids. Lunch at the high school is NEVER boring!

Administrative Report 11/9/2022

It has been an eventful month between board meetings. This month I meet with some community partners who are working on putting together a trail between the high school and the K8. This was a very productive meeting and represents some great opportunities for our students and community.

The new CTE building is making significant progress with the skeleton of the structure erected. The building should be dried in before Winter Break and work should start on the inside of the building. The anticipated opening of the building for student will be in time for the third trimester.

Some significant work was completed at the high school. The flues for venting the hot-water heaters in the old section of the building were upgraded to bring them into compliance with code.

We have been busy with the Health Planning grant we received from Oregon Health Authority. As part of that grant we have been meeting with community partners, Adventist, TFCC and the County Health Department and discussing ways we could work together to address the health needs of our students and community. These meetings have been very encouraging.

As part of the CTE revitalization grant we picked up our first of two food carts. The other is anticipated before Winter Break. The carts will help us expand our CTE offerings.

#### **NEW K-8 SCHOOL**

All community members were supportive of a new school to serve a K-8 population wi prudent planning to take on pre-k and enrollment growth in the future. The solutions v between a new stand-alone facility or a new K-5 facility tied to the existing which woul converted to a 6-8.

A factor in the decision is what to do with the existing structure that is undergoing a srehab Summer 2017 due to a grant received by the State. The criteria of the grant are building remain standing for 10 years (till February 2026) and that at least a portion be for educational or educational support services.

#### FINANCIAL INFORMATION ABOUT THE PROPOSED BOND ISSUE

A Measure has been referred for voter consideration on the May 15, 2018 which, if passed, would allow Nestucca Valley School District to sell \$25,700,000 in General Obligation Bonds. If the bond measure passes, the District is expected to qualify for \$4,000,000 of State-matching funds.



The current tax rate is \$0.68 per \$1,000 of assessed home value. The proposed bond measure would mean a property tax increase at an estimated rate of \$0.99 per \$1,000 of assessed (not market) value. For the owner of a \$250,000 (assessed value) home, taxes would increase from \$14.17 per month to \$34.79 per month if the measure passes. The increased levy would remain in place through 2038.

### PROPOSED PROJECTS if the bond measure passes

#### Create a K-8 Campus

- Build new classrooms, commons, a cafeteria, media commons, gymnasium.
- The Elementary School would house grades X-8 on one campus, leaving students in grades 9-12 at the High School.
- Students in grades 6-8 will be housed in a proposed addition to the school.

#### Safety Projects

- A secured entry, replacement of door locks, installation of video cameras, and all students housed in one building.
- Existing modular classrooms (portables) would be removed.
- Parking and traffic circulation would be expanded to separate parent and bus pick up and drop off.

#### Infrastructure Repairs

 The proposed bond would replace the exterior paint, replace existing windows and renovate electrical systems and plumbing. Asbestos would be abated, and repairs would be made to the plumbing and drinking water systems.

#### Community Use

- The construction of a second gymnasium would provide additional space for NVES and NJSR High, including drama, music, and sports.
- By expanding common space, media center, and gym, community groups would be able to use the facilities after hours.

#### **High School Changes**

 The relocation of 7th and 8th grade students to the elementary school campus would allow the School District to have space for additional CTE offerings.

#### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

## What projects would occur at Beaver Middle School? Would the gym be open?

On February 12, 2018 the Nestucca Valley Board of Directors directed Superintendent Wharton to have the Beaver property appraised, and listed for sale with a real estate agent. The district still uses the gym, after school hours, for programs to our junior high students. The construction of a second gymnasium would allow for use by drama, music, sports, and other programs at district schools.

#### How old is the Nestucca Valley Elementary School?

The elementary school opened 67 years ago.

#### If the bond passes, what new programs would be available to students?

Dedicated music room and computer labs available to all K-8 students; shared art and science lab rooms for the middle school students with project-based / hands-on learning opportunities.

#### What projects would occur if the bond measure does not pass?


If the bond measure does not pass, the 7th and 8th graders would not be moved out of the JR/SR high and to NVES to create the K-8. The proposed drinking water project at NVES would not be completed. The district would not apply for the \$4 million matching grant.

#### What happens to property taxes if the bond measure does not pass?

If the measure does not pass, the additional rate of \$0.99 per \$1,000 of assessed home value will not be assessed, the current tax rate of \$0.71 per \$1,000 of assessed home value will remain in place until 2028.

#### What other funding sources were considered?

The District received \$1.49 million for seismic repairs to the elementary and could receive \$4,000,000 in a State grant if the bond measure passes related to projects at the elementary school. The District would pursue grants and foundation donations for the projects that would be addressed with proceeds from the bond measure, if it passes.









Program Diagram Exploded Program Diagram
