Superintendent's Message

December 15, 2017

THE STATE OF THE NESTUCCA VALLEY SCHOOL DISTRICT

I find it hard to believe that we are breaking for Winter Break, already!

The 2017-18 school has been moving fast, and our students and staff are looking forward to a well-deserved vacation.

Many of you may have heard a reference to Measure 98. This measure, passed in the fall of 2016, by Oregon voters, creates a mandate to place emphasis upon ninth graders on track to graduate, the dropout rate and Career and Technical Education. As a district we receive specials funds that are set aside for just that work. The administrative team will be drafting a plan for the Oregon Department of Education, detailing what goals and action steps we will set for our students to find success in the three identified areas. There will be much more to come on this in the 2018 year.

The board of directors, community stakeholders and staff recently took on the project of creating a strategic plan for the Nestucca Valley School District. This document, adopted by the board of directors on December 11, 2017, creates the vision, mission statement, fiscal practice goals, and ranked objectives that the staff will work with over the next five years. This plan holds administration accountable for decisions and lays a clear path for the direction the school district will move in. Simply put, it is a prioritization of needs/wants for the district. The document will be made public in January of 2018.

"Learners Today, Leaders Tomorrow"

The Nestucca Valley School District has qualified in the number one spot for the possibility to receive four million dollars from the State of Oregon for a capital improvement project. In order to receive the grant, the district must pass a general obligation bond in the May 2018 general election. If the district does not pass the bond, then the four-million-dollar grant will go to another district. On December 11, 2018 the board of directors voted to place a bond on the May 2018 ballot for the creation of a K-8 facility on the existing elementary school campus. The district would seek to renovate the existing structure as well as add some new square footage in order to create a K-8 campus. Many more specifics about the proposal will be shared in the near future.

From January to May the district will begin to hold public planning sessions, question and answer sessions, surveys and strive to educate all voters with the facts of the proposed bond. This is a big undertaking for the school district. Anyone who wishes to assist in the work, please feel free to contact me.

FOR FAMILIES 12TH GRADE CHECKLIST

JANUARY

If your student hasn't completed the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), this is the month to do it! The FAFSA is used by federal and state governments, as well as by many colleges and scholarship providers to award financial aid.

There are four basic types of financial aid that you might be eligible to receive: grants, scholarships, loans, and work study. Grants and scholarships do not need to be paid back.

Complete the FAFSA.

- Remind your student to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid if he or she hasn't done so already. Your student will likely need your help in obtaining all of the documents they need to file the FAFSA. This includes social security numbers, tax returns and other financial information.
- The Student Aid Report (SAR) is a summary of what your student filled out on the FAFSA – offer to go over the information to make sure that everything is correct and make any changes if necessary by March 15.
- Continue applying for scholarships.
- Help your student search for scholarships online and check with your employer or organizations you might be a part of for scholarship opportunities.

Make a summer plan.

- Encourage your student to apply for summer enrichment programs, internships or jobs.
- Many college orientation programs take place during the summer, so help students make their plans accordingly.

4 Register with Selective Service.

Male students must register with Selective Service within 30 days (before or after) of their 18th birthday. If they do not register, they will not be eligible for federal financial aid for college.

Have a wonderful vacation! See you in 2018!





OUR FARM TO SCHOOL PROGRAM

Farm to school activities enhance classroom education and encourage healthy lifestyles through hands-on learning, tasting fresh fruits and vegetables, gardening, and direct engagement with farmers. Food Roots has partnered with FoodCorps and the Oregon Department of Agriculture since 2011 to serve all three school districts in Tillamook County.

2016-2017 PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

- 737 students received 242 hours of food and gardening based lessons
- 1178 samples of locally grown produce were given out at 8 Tasting Tables
- 147 pounds of school garden produce harvested and \$470 raised through School to Market sales
- 25 students experienced a day on the farm at Nehalem River Ranch
- 1061 students participated in farm to school programming in 2016-2017!

ON THE HORIZON FOR 2017-2018

- 875 students will receive food and gardening based lessons
- 1175 students will have the opportunity to try local produce at 20 Tasting Tables
- 3 Local Food Open Houses will celebrate the variety of food producers in Tillamook County

- 18 engagement events will encourage families to explore 6 school gardens
