ALL THE GREAT THINGS HAPPENING IN THE NESTUCCA VALLEY SCHOOL DISTRICT

It may be that complaining is part of human nature, and many conversations focus on things that are not quite right. We don't often recognize the positive things around us. While nothing is perfect and our schools can always be made better, great things are happening in our little piece of the world. These are some of the things that are making a positive impact on our students, teachers and community!

WHAT'S HAPPENING NOW?

ACADEMICS

- ❖ NJSR High School was ranked 15th by *US News & World Report* among the best high schools in the state of Oregon in 2017. It is Oregon's highest ranking 2A school.
- ❖ The Oregon Department of Education rates every public school on a scale from 1 (lowest) to 5 (highest) each year. In 2017 Nestucca Valley Elementary School rose from a Level 2 ranking to a Level 4, placing it above the state average for student academic growth and achievement.
- ❖ The NJSR High School has maintained a Level 4 ranking for student academic growth and achievement for the past six years.
- ❖ 10% of our high school students are currently enrolled in at least one college class.
- ❖ NVSD implemented a new technology scope and sequence for grades K-12 this year.
- ❖ The district placed 90 laptop computers in the 6-12 grade classrooms, funded primarily through federal grants.
- ❖ The district adopted a new K-12 language arts curriculum for the current school year.
- ❖ Our Youth Transitions Program (YTP) is operating two small business: T-shirt creations and a coffee shop.

GRANTS

- ❖ Our district applied for and received \$1,807,167.96 in grant monies this year from numerous sponsors to support facilities, art, PE, ELL, and music enrichment programs.

EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES/STUDENT ENRICHMENT

- ❖ 71% of our NJSR High students participate in extra-curricular activities.
- ❖ In an effort to create greater inclusivity for all families we no longer charge participation fees to our students.

"Learners Today, Leaders Tomorrow"

- ❖ Participation in our youth baseball and softball programs has increased enough to fill two teams at various age brackets.
- ❖ NJSR High is one of a very few schools to offer a certified Oregon Drivers Education program as part of the regular daily curriculum. After successfully completing the classroom and driving evaluations, students receive a Certification of Completion from the Department of Transportation, serving as a DMV drive test waiver valid for two years.
- ❖ Our school garden is thriving. The produce grown in our garden will once again be sold at Farmers Markets and be used to feed our summer school program students.
- ❖ NVSD continues to place an emphasis on financially supporting our art and music programs.
- ❖ New art murals cover the walls of NJSR High’s restroom entrance. Student artists completed the work.
- ❖ A new class, Nestucca Inc., focuses on projects that take pride in their school.
- ❖ The NJSR High speech team has gone to State for the past 10 years straight.
- ❖ Our NJSR High girls and boys basketball teams were both voted winners of the “Sportsmanship Award” in the Northwest League.
- ❖ K-6 students receive a monthly art literacy program that highlights the diversity, culture, and history of our world. Students in grades 7-12 have art classes available throughout the day.
- ❖ Our student musicians continue to place among the top performers in the State.
- ❖ Our student engineers have finished in the Top Ten in the State for the last ten years. They have won First Place in the Oregon State University Bridge Building contest for the last four years. Teams placing first or second are qualified to travel to the international bridge building competition, which will be held in Chicago this spring.
- ❖ NJSR High student engineers have won Oregon State University’s Pumpkin Chucking Contest for the last five years.
- ❖ Our 6th grade students participate in Science Outdoor School.
- ❖ Our Junior Career Exploration students (High School Juniors) spend 18 hours shadowing a professional in the field they are considering after high school graduation.

PARTNERSHIPS

- ❖ We have expanded opportunities for our kids through partnerships with many local nonprofit organizations and clubs. Our partners include Start Making a Reader Today (SMART), Nestucca Valley Athletic Supporters Inc. (NVASI), Community Arts Project (CAP), Food Roots, Back Pack Program, Nesko Women’s Club, Nestucca Valley Community Alliance (NVCA), Nestucca Neskowin Watershed Council, and the Tillamook County Health Department.

- ❖ NJSR High students are enrolled in college classes or benefit from CTE experiences through Tillamook Bay Community College, Chemeketa Community College, Oregon Coast Community College, and Oregon State University.

LOOKING TO THE FUTURE

- ❖ The Nestucca Valley School District administration, Board of Directors, staff, and community members worked diligently to develop a five-year Strategic Plan that will be implemented in the 2018-2019 school year.
- ❖ NVSD will adopt a new K-12 math curriculum and a new K-12 science curriculum using both grant monies and general fund money beginning in the 2018-2019 school year.
- ❖ We will expand our offering in Career and Technical Education (CTE).
- ❖ We will establish our own branch of the Future Farmers of America.
- ❖ We will increase participation in our summer school program by adding 7th and 8th graders to our summer student population. This year's session will run from July 9, 2018 through July 26, 2018.
- ❖ NVES will once again sponsor a Food Service Corp Member in our district, who will continue to offer nutrition and garden lessons once a week through the 2018-2019 school year.
- ❖ For the 2018-2019 school year we will move from providing two meals a day to our students to providing four meals a day to our students (K-12). We will add a "snack" in the afternoon and a "supper" after school, so that all students under the age of 18 can eat for free. These additional meals will not be an added district expense. Rather, a state-funded program will pay the district to provide these meals to our students.

This is just a sampling of some of the things we have to celebrate in our schools and community!

Thank you to each and every community member, family and educator that makes this possible for "our kids"!

NJSHS News from Mr. Richwine

I wanted to take this opportunity to remind everyone of the Essential Skill requirements for graduation. Each high school student in the state of Oregon must pass Essential Skills in Reading, Writing and Math. During their Junior year of high school, each student takes the Smart Balanced Assessment (SBAC). During this time, each student also develops work samples in reading, math and writing. If the SBAC is not passed, two samples of each subject must be passed in order to graduate. Teachers provide students several opportunities each year to do work samples, in order to ease the pressure of the SBAC. If the SBAC, or two work samples of each subject matter, aren't passed by January of the student's Senior year, that student will retake the SBAC and continue producing work samples. We focus very hard and keeping track of each student's progression towards meeting Essential Skills.

If you have questions on where your student is in regards to meeting Essential Skills, you can find this out by looking on ParentVue. Once you're in ParentVue, click on Course History and then in the upper right corner, click on Graduation Status. This is a screen that shows you how many credits are left in each subject area for your student to complete. Below the credit chart is a chart that shows the Essential Skills that are still left for your student to pass. If you have any questions about any of this, please feel free to contact our counselor Taileigh Prickett at taileighp@nestucca.k12.or.us. If you don't have a ParentVue login, please contact our front office and they would be happy to set you up with a login.

Also, as the season of testing is beginning, please make sure that your student is getting enough rest and is eating before he or she is coming to school. These growing kids need rest and nutrition for their brains to function well for these important tests. Thanks for helping us with your child's education.

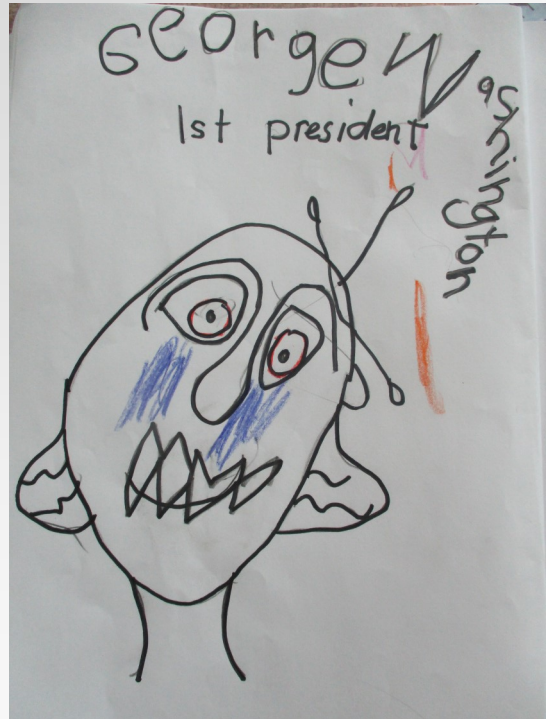

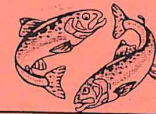
