Superintendent's Message

December 6, 2019

THE STATE OF THE NESTUCCA VALLEY SCHOOL DISTRICT

BOND- I am very excited to report that we were able to lock in our Guaranteed Maximum Price of construction and renovation of our K-8 facility on budget at 24.7 Million! We have entered our second phase of the bond construction work. Demolition of the old cafeteria, and music room will begin next week, as will preparations for footings and foundations. It is anticipated that framing of the new addition will begin in February of 2020. Our completion date for all new construction and renovation is still August of 2021.

STUDENT SUCCESS ACT-(SSA) Thank you to all who participated in the SSA survey process. The next stage of our data collection as a district will include community meetings and individual student, staff and parent interviews. Much of this work will take place in the next few weeks and the first two weeks of January. If you are interested in participating further, please contact me.

As a district, the goal of gathering the SSA data is to submit a plan to the Oregon Department of Education, detailing how we plan to invest our SSA money that we have been allocated. The final amount that our district will be allocated has not been assigned yet. It is anticipated to be in the range of \$350,000-\$425,000. Much more information to come on the SSA and how our district invests the money.

SCHOOL DELAY AND CLOSURE- It is the time of year that we need to review the process for school delay and closure. Each morning when the weather and roads are of a questionable nature, the NVSD administrative team and transportation coordinator awake at 4:30 am. With the assistance of bus drivers, we begin to look at roads and consider weather reports. Our school district covers 419 square miles of land! Much of our district is on windy river side roads, which presents a challenge for us when determining what the roads are like in every region. As a district we will always error on the side of caution. We take this into consideration when building our school year calendar and add numerous days above the state mandated number to account for days that our district may not be in session when others are.

It is always our goal to have a report out to patrons by 5:45am-6:00am each school day. If school is cancelled, then you can also conclude that all evening activities are also cancelled. If we issue a two-hour delay, know that we are still monitoring conditions and still may cancel school. If families are signed up with the district to receive automated message, a message will go out at 5:45-6:00am. If you are not on the automated list, please contact the office to be placed on the list. The district will also update our Facebook page with school delays or closures.

Thank you all for being so flexible and understanding with our district as we juggle all of this construction work. I hope each of you has a wonderful holiday season!

DECEMBER

- Finish applying to colleges.
- ☐ Fill out and submit any lingering applications for college, job training, or other post-high school plans.
- ☐ You may qualify for a waiver so you won't have to pay the application fee - ask your counselor how to get one.
- Talk to current college students.
- ☐ Connect with alumni from your high school who may be home on break or reach out to college students on social media.

- Get set for scholarships.
- ☐ Create an OSAC profile and begin filling out the application information using your list of activities and accomplishments.
- ☐ Update your list of scholarships you plan to apply
- Catch up on details.
- Use the winter break to catch up on any tasks you haven't vet completed for college applications and financial aid.

KEY TERMS:

OSAC: The initials for Oregon's Office of Student Access and Completion. This office is important to all future and current college students in the state because they're responsible for distributing the Oregon Opportunity Grant (state-funded financial aid) and more than 450 scholarships for Oregon students. The application to apply for scholarships is often called "the OSAC" for short.





K-4 AND the 5th and 6th Grade Band Concert Tuesday, Dec. 17 at the High School Gym

Students in grades K-4 will perform at 6:00 pm. 5th and 6th grade band students will perform at 7:10 pm. There is ample parking at the high school for this event.

When you arrive to the High School, please note teachers will <u>only</u> be available for supervision of students 15 minutes before each performance time. Please keep your students with you until that time.

Students K-2 will meet with their teacher and class in the cafeteria beginning at 5:45.

First and second grades will move up to the gym at 5:55.

Kindergarten will remain in the cafeteria until show time.

Third and fourth grade students will meet with their teacher and class <u>on the bleachers</u> in the gym beginning at 5:45.

K-4 students will sit in the north (student) bleachers with their classes during the <u>entire</u> concert. Please do not try to take your children from the bleachers during the concert. It is disruptive and impolite to take your children before the concert is over.

When the K-4 concert is complete, teachers will escort their classes to the cafeteria where you may pick up your student(s). Students will use the back stairwell by the band room to walk to the cafeteria and parents/guardians will use the main stairwell outside the gym, through the commons, to the cafeteria. Again – no early pick-ups! We want to make sure everyone is accounted for – please meet in the cafeteria to pick up your student(s)!

6th grade band students will meet their teachers at 6:55 in the **band** room.

5th grade band students will meet their teachers at 6:55 in the **choir** room.

If band students attend the K-4 concert, they may drop their instruments, music folders, etc. off at the band or choir room first, then go to the K-4 concert.

If 5/6 band students arrive early, please wait in the commons area until 6:55.

From Teacher Ashlee and her team in the Head Start classroom: We will be continuing the tree study through December; in November we got the opportunity to go to The Tillamook Forest Center. There kids had the chance to walk up to the lookout tower, look at the different types of animals that live in the forest and take a nature walk. In December we will also be learning new winter songs with Cookie Debbie and her guitar.

From Teacher Autum and her team in the Preschool Promise classroom: This month we will be continuing studying community helpers. So far we have already learned about so many people who help in our communities, including firefighters, police, doctors, dentists, teachers, mail carriers, plumbers, construction workers and chefs. We still have many more important jobs to learn about through this month. In November we worked hard on practicing fire safety. We made an escape plan at school and practiced how we would escape during a fire. We also talked about what to do at home, and that it is important to have a meeting spot with our families. We will continue working hard on recognizing emotions in ourselves but also with our friends, and then what to do once we identify that emotion. We've practiced lots of techniques that can help with different emotions for ourselves and others. We have also been working hard on listening to our friends and being a bucket filler friend. (How can you fill someone's bucket up today?)







From Teacher Ebony in the Littles Room (1-2 year olds): We have been exploring sensory through touch of different textures. We have put up a picture so parents can see what we have been up to with play, arts and crafts and outside play. And we have been learning shapes and

colors.

Reinforce Math Skills With Everyday Activities

solid foundation in math is essential for students to succeed in school and beyond. Incorporate math into your family's daily life—without a lot of time, effort, or expense—with these fun ideas.

In the kitchen. Cooking is not only a terrific way to help children understand fractions—it's also excellent family bonding time. Show younger children how measuring two half-cups of flour yields the same

amount as one full cup. Ask older children to help you cut a recipe in half or double a recipe. Have them write down the new measurements and check the computations together.

At the grocery store. Bring a calculator with you to the store when you shop. Young children can add up how much you have spent on groceries or saved with coupons. Kids in third grade or higher can help determine which size of detergent offers the best value, or whether using a particular coupon is cost-effective.

In the garage. A tire gauge is one of the simplest tools for a child to use, and can help him or her learn about addition and subtraction. Show your child how to measure the pressure in your bicycle or car tires. Then, have your child help you determine how much air you need to add or release. Older children can calculate gas mileage.

On the computer. Find activities that reinforce math skills, from computer games like Math Blaster to apps.

On the road. Long car trips were made for math games. Pick a number from one to 10 and have each family member try to find a license plate with the target number. Younger children can add the numbers together. Children who have learned subtraction can try to find one that involves adding a few of the numbers and then subtracting one.

Kids who have learned multiplication and division can put those skills to use.

At the toy store. If your child is trying to save up to buy something special, keep a chart of how much money

they will need and what they have saved to date.

At home. Classic games such as dominoes, cards, puzzles, or Monopoly teach math reasoning. Sewing and building projects both involve plenty of computation. Teach your child how to measure and sew fabrics together, or build basic structures out of wood (with adult supervision).

Above all, avoid passing any math phobias that you might have on to your child. It's important for children to hear at home that what they're learning is

valuable—that all the work they're doing trying to comprehend division or fractions or measurement will pay off their whole lives.

Cómo Reforzar las Destrezas en Matemáticas con las Actividades Diarias

Para que los estudiantes tengan éxito en la escuela y en el futuro, es esencial una base sólida en matemáticas. Incorpore las matemáticas en la vida diaria de su familia—sin mucho tiempo, esfuerzo, o gasto—con las siguientes ideas para actividades entretenidas.

En la cocina. Por medio de cocinar y hornear sus niños pueden comprender las fracciones—y son además excelentes actividades para unir a la familia. Enséñeles a los niños menores que medir media taza de harina dos veces da lo mismo que una taza entera. Pídales a los niños mayores que le ayuden a cortar una receta a la mitad, o a doblar una receta. Hágalos que escriban las

una receta. Hágalos que escriban las medidas nuevas y después revisen juntos los cálculos.

En el supermercado. Lleve una calculadora cuando va de compras. Los niños menores pueden sumar cuánto Ud. ha gastado en las compras, o cuánto ha ahorrado con los cupones. Los niños del tercer grado en adelante pueden ayudar a determinar qué tamaño de detergente ofrece el mejor valor, o qué cupón puede resultar en mayores ahorros.

En el garaje. Una de las herramientas más simples que puede usar un niño y que puede al mismo tiempo ayudarle a aprender acerca de sumar y restar, es

un indicador de presión de neumáticos. Enséñele a su niño a medir la presión de las ruedas de la bicicleta o automóvil, y después pidale que le ayude a determinar la cantidad de aire que se debe agregar o descargar. Los niños mayores pueden calcular el consumo de combustible por milla del automóvil.

En la computadora. Encuentre actividades que refuercen las destrezas en las matemáticas, como los videojuegos al estilo de "Math Blaster" y otras aplicaciones.

En la carretera. Los viajes largos en el automóvil son perfectos para los juegos que utilizan las matemáticas. Elija un número de 1 a 10 y haga que cada miembro de la familia trate de encontrar una placa de otro automóvil con éste. Los niños menores pueden sumar los números, y aquellos que han aprendido sustracción pueden tratar de encontrar una placa que hace posible la suma de algunos números y luego la sustracción de otro número. Los niños que han aprendido

multiplicación y división pueden utilizar aquellas destrezas.

En la juguetería. Si su niño está ahorrando dinero para comprar algo especial, mantenga un cuadro de gráficas indicando cuánto dinero va a necesitar y la cantidad que ha ahorrado hasta la fecha.

En casa. Los juegos clásicos tales como el dominó, los naipes, las rompecabezas o "Monopoly" enseñan razonamiento matemático. También los proyectos de costura y construcción involucran bastantes ejercicios matemáticos. Enséñele a su niño a medir y coser telas, o a construir estructuras básicas de madera (bajo la supervisión de un adulto).

Sobre todo, evite comunicarle a su niño cualquier fobia que usted pueda tener en cuanto a las matemáticas. Es importante que los niños escuchen en casa que lo que ellos están aprendiendo es valioso — que todo el trabajo que están haciendo para comprender la

división o las fracciones o las medidas les será útil para el resto de sus vidas
