We will look to next year through the scope of flexibility. I wish I could say that everything will return to “normal,” but that is not very likely. So as an administrative team, we will spend the summer working to develop a Pre-K-12 instructional offering that can be implemented in a physical classroom, as well as through a distance model. We will communicate regularly, as the state and county issue continued guidance about what our practices must look like. We will stay vigilant in monitoring what the latest guidance is concerning student athletics and activities, while striving to create opportunity for our kids to begin to engage in those activities again. While I do not know exactly how fall will look for all of us, I do know one thing. This school district, and community, will meet the challenge and create a successful environment for all of our members.
