CODE OF CONDUCT

As you (hopefully!) know, there is a district Code of Conduct, published in the Elementary Handbook (online on the district website and hard copies, if you'd like, in the school office). We are using a model as a guide that many schools around the country are using – from the Syracuse, NY public schools. At JSS we also have monthly grade level "Code of Conduct" meetings. At these meetings we talk about growth mindset (topic for another newsletter!), the rules of our school and how things are going. The discussion is framed by a picture book on the theme – similar to our all-school assemblies. These are important meeting for me and hopefully for our students and staff – to connect how the culture and climate of the school on a regular basis.

Tis that time of year – plus the Daylight Saving time change – excitement in the air. We support the Trick or Treat for UNICEF project and Morning Math Club coordinates the giving out of the boxes (next Tuesday, the 30th). Philosophy of Student Conduct and Support

The Northampton Public Schools believe that all students have the right to be educated in an environment where they are safe, respected, and are accepted for who they are. We believe that by teaching students strategies to manage conflict and to problem solve together, relationships will be nurtured and repaired as needed and students will be able to gain the skills and knowledge they need to be engaged citizens in a global society.

Guiding Principles

The following guiding principles from our core social and emotional learning curricula inform all Code policies and practices.

- 1. Teaching social and emotional skills is as important as teaching academic content.
- 2. How we teach is as important as what we teach.
- 3. Great cognitive growth occurs through social interaction.
- 4. How we work together as adults to cre-ate a safe, joyful, and inclusive school environment is as important as our individual contribution or competence.
- 5. What we know and believe about our students—individually, culturally, developmentally—informs our expec¬tations, reactions, and attitudes about those students.
 - 6. Partnering with families—knowing them and valuing their contributions—is as important as knowing the children we teach.

Essential Cognitive, Affective, and Behavioral Competencies

Our core social and emotional learning curricula incorporate seek to promote the following five essential cognitive, affective, and behavioral competencies identified by the Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning (CASEL).

1. Self Awareness

The ability to accurately recognize one's own emotions, thoughts, and values and how they influence behavior. The ability to accurately assess one's strengths and limitations, with a well-grounded sense of confidence, optimism, and a "growth mindset." Self awareness skills include:

- · Identifying emotions
- · Accurate self-perception
- · Recognizing strengths
- Self-confidence
- · Self-efficacy
- 2. Self Management

The ability to successfully regulate one's emotions, thoughts, and behaviors in different situations — effectively managing stress, controlling impulses, and motivating oneself. The ability to set and work toward personal and academic goals. Self management skills include:

- · Impulse control
- Stress management
- Self-discipline
- Self-motivation
- Goal-setting
- · Organizational skills
- 3. Social Awareness

The ability to take the perspective of and empathize with others, including those from diverse backgrounds and cultures. The ability to understand social and ethical norms for behavior and to recognize family, school, and community resources and supports. Social awareness skills include:

- Perspective-taking
- · Empathy

- · Appreciating diversity
- · Respect for others
- 4. Relationship Skills

The ability to establish and maintain healthy and rewarding relationships with diverse individuals and groups. The ability to communicate clearly, listen well, cooperate with others, resist inappropriate social pressure, negotiate conflict constructively, and seek and offer help when needed. Relationship skills include:

- Communication
- Social engagement
- · Relationship-building
- Teamwork
- 5. Responsible Decision Making

The ability to make constructive choices about personal behavior and social interactions based on ethical standards, safety concerns, and social norms. The realistic evaluation of consequences of various actions, and a consideration of the well-being of oneself and others. Responsible decision making skills include:

- · Identifying problems
- · Analyzing situations
- Solving problems
- Evaluating
- · Reflecting
- · Ethical responsibility
