Non-Discriminaton Policy

The North Canton City School District affirms that no persons shall, on the basis of sex, race, color, national origin, or disability, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any educational program or activity conducted under its auspices. In the words of Peter Parker's Uncle Ben, "With great power comes great responsibility," and we feel a similar accountability with the passage of Issue 4. So how will we manage the responsibility of additional resources from taxpayers? Our goals for this levy are to continue to offer maximum services to our students, staff, families and community, and to make this levy last as far beyond the promise of 2023 as possible.

- 1) Staff contracts: part of the planning behind Issue 4 was the ability provide fair and equitable wage/benefit packages to our hardworking and dedicated staff. Staff base salaries had been frozen for 10 years with no cost of living increases. Please be aware that increases in staff salaries are tied to increased premium contributions for insurance benefits. Any wage/benefit packages agreed to will not jeopardize our promise for this levy to extend to 2023 and beyond.
- 2) Grant funding: continue to seek non-taxpayer grants to help fund academic learning. We will continue to research grant opportunities to provide additional funding at all

educational levels. This year we have been awarded two new grants through the Ohio Department of Education. As other opportunities present themselves, we will work tirelessly to obtain new monies.

- 3) Private funding: continue to seek non-taxpayer support to fund athletic facility upgrades. As of the writing of this article, \$1.9 million has been committed to these projects over the next three years. By June 30 of this year, we will have received \$800,000 which will exceed the cost of the newly approved Fieldhouse project at Memorial Stadium.
- 4) Spending: we will continue to be diligent in evaluating all expenditure of district funds to ensure responsible purchases that will benefit our students. Constant review of vendor contracts for best pricing is a must.

We thank you for your support of our district and students. We do not take the passage of this levy lightly and understand it comes with great expectations that we manage these resources wisely and make it last to 2023 or beyond.

Seven pass Resident Educator **Summative Assessment**









Hoover's Career Tech Programs a Path to College or Career

North Canton City, Jackson Local, Lake Local and Plain Local School Districts are members of The Stark County Career Compact, which allows students to choose a Career Tech Program that meets their vocational needs and interests. Hoover High School houses seven different programs, including Pre-Engineering, Biomedical Sciences, Business Management, Culinary, Interactive Media, Video Productions/ Broadcast Journalism, **Teaching** Professions, Medical Technologies. The old concept of "Career Tech" has changed because the programs now often serve as a launchpad for students ready to enter college, some already with college credits, and a confidence that they have chosen a field that meets their career goals. As Video Productions instructor Tim McCarty explains, "Many think a Career Tech education is an alternative to college. As I tell my students and parents, Career Tech is not necessarily an alternative to college. We're an alternative path to college."

For example, in Video Productions, students learn quickly we 'work' for something bigger than a grade and it takes more than a 50-minute class to produce quality content. In our program students are exposed to many experiences, such as working for paying clients. These interactions while in high school teach how each role works and how media industry collaboration is the key to creating successful content. What's also unique for Video Productions students is to understand that the skills they're learning have real 'value' beyond school."

Video Productions students enjoyed a successful year:

- Placed third in the state in the OSBA video contest in Columbus.
- Received six EXCELLENT ratings for HVTV content at the Ohio Scholastic Media State Conference.
- Saw the student film, "Identity Crisis," produced by seniors Morgann Schlabach, Holly Cooper, Natalie Rivera and Mackenzie Shawk, finish in the Top15 films in the Multi-state region (400 films from 22 states) in this year's National 10-Day Film Challenge.
- Celebrated the student film, "The Cindea Quotient," produced by seniors Morgann Schlabach and Holly

Cooper, selected Best Student Film in the Girls on the Run LUNAFEST Student Film Competition this May.

 Created over 400 pieces of video content, including news, sports, district, clients and students projects, this academic year.



Mrs. Shirley Dobry, instructor of <u>Teaching Professions</u> at Hoover High School, appreciates the fact that students are able to explore some of their career ideas in a way that can either help them re-evaluate the choice, or feel stronger about their path in Career Tech programs. In Teaching Professions, she says, "The field experience is a strength of the program. Students get a better understanding of the behind-the-scenes work that teachers do so they know what to expect in the real world. Even jobs that people enjoy are challenging at times."

Mrs. Dobry noted that all students in the teaching program, both juniors and seniors, were able to complete the new portfolio and WebXam testing, and, most impressively, ALL students earned college credit for their efforts based on their final scores! Also, she explained that teachers worked to submit a new Career Technical Assurance Guide (CTAG) for students to receive college credit. The new CTAG was accepted by Ohio Department of Higher Education.

<u>Medical Technologies</u> also celebrated accomplishments this year:

- 100% passing rate on the STNA exam
- Blood Drive with the American Red Cross raised \$1000 in scholarships.
- 100% passing rates on all 4 webxam tests for all seniors.
- Implementation of student mentor program, senior leadership big sister/brother and little brother/sister program, all student-created and led.

Mrs. Angela Combs says she believes the Hoover Career Tech program is unique in the way students are managed. "I believe once our students join career tech they are expected to behave as young professionals. I believe they are permitted the autonomy and flexibility necessary to grow and develop into young adults and professionals. Our students are trusted and encouraged to manage schedules, extra duties brought on by career tech and are supported by staff and administrators in doing this. For example, my students may miss some core class time for clinical, they are trusted to communicate this, to make arrangements for missed work, and to get themselves to and from facilities as an adult would."


Interactive Media, taught by Mr. Gary Bodenschatz, took on a unique challenge this year. Students were asked to create all the athletic programs for the Hoover sports teams. Most importantly, the project was accomplished by meeting all deadlines and received positive reviews. Athletic Director, Tim Walker, would like to continue this undertaking into future years. Interactive Media students, Austin Coontz (grade 9-10 category), and Rebecca Glatz (grade 11-12 category) won first place in the Mental Health Poster Contest.

The <u>Culinary Program</u> enjoyed an accomplishment by a Hoover student, who was accepted to Sullivan University as a junior and will go on a full scholarship as an Eagle Scout.



student <u>Business</u> <u>Management</u> companies had a very successful year, competing in two Junior Achievement (JA) Company Program competitions locally. In Cleveland, Drops took first place earning a \$1000 company bonus and ReImagine took third place, earning a \$250 bonus. At Stark State the next day for our local JA Region competition, Beelieve took first place (\$750 bonus) and ReImagine took second place (\$500 bonus). In addition, Beelieve was selected to attend the National Student Leadership Summit in Washington,

D.C., to compete for the national JA Company of the Year award. Only 15 teams from around the US are selected. Beelieve is the fifth team to represent Hoover in the last four years.



<u>Biomedical Science</u> has also enjoyed a successful year, both for the program and individuals.

Progran

- Hoover Program named a Project Lead The Way Distinguished School.
- The program received a \$1,500 grant through the Perry Initiative to encourage more females to go into orthopedics.
- 86% of students were able to pass the WebXam for Human Anatomy and Physiology.
- 53 Biomed seniors participated in our annual STEM Fair and presented their capstone projects.
- 795 job-shadowing hours were logged by seniors.

Students

- Alex Goldman took pharmacy classes alongside MI & BI (senior biomed courses) and has already lined up a job in a pharmacy while she attends college.
- Sydney Green, Amanda Palutsis, and Seth Brown scored an 8 on the PLTW EoC for Medical Interventions (out of 10).
- 53/53 students indicated they were heading to a four-year college program.
- 46/53 students intend to pursue a STEM major.


















Project Lead the Way

following criteria:


- Offer at least three PLTW courses;



Jeff Hite Announces Retirement

Hoover High School has announced that Jeff Hite has decided to retire as Head Baseball Coach at North Canton Hoover High School following a 28year coaching career at the school. Hite served as head coach for the Hoover softball team from 1991-2004 leading the softball program to their first two State Championships, five District Championships and seven Federal League Championships while amassing 341 wins. Athletic Facilities Project funded by **Private Donations**

The athletic facilities project has entered Phase II this spring, thanks to the funding provided by private donations. The private donations, which total approximately \$800,000, are being used for handicap accessibility, adequate facilities for all students and improved safety features for all student-athletes.

Phase I was completed last year and included resurfacing the track at the stadium and asphalt on the parking area on the east side of the stadium.

Phase II will include two projects. The first is a multi-purpose facility that will provide storage, concessions, locker rooms and offices. The second is a bleacher project at the softball field.

Athletic Director Tim Walker is excited by the improvements. "We've recognized the need to improve different aspects of the athletic facilities and adjacent fields, and these generous individuals have made the facilities project possible."
