

On behalf of the North Canton City Schools Board of Education, administration, staff, and students, thank you for your support of Issue 16. The results of the March election are now official, and we are excited to move forward in the process of constructing new pre-k through grade five school buildings. These new buildings will provide 21st century learning spaces, enhanced technology, handicap accessibility, and efficiency of services. Passage of Issue 16 demonstrates the strong values of our community and residents' recognition that when students excel, our community benefits in many ways.

We are excited as we begin the three to four-year construction process. We began the facilities program at the May board of education meeting by hiring Sol Harris/Day. The architectural firm will design the two new elementary buildings and handle abatement and demolition of the existing buildings. This month we have started to hold Core Team meetings every two week. The team consists of the design team and the district administrative team at this time. At these meetings we are discussion the time schedules, design ideas, budget estimates, the impact of COVID-19, as well as other relevant topics. We will move forward with requests for quotes and proposals.

In July we will select a construction manager, who will join our bi-weekly Core Team meetings to discuss the project's scope and budget, logistics and schedule. In mid-August we will invite a large group of people to attend a "Visioning Session" led by Sol Harris/Day. Members of this group will include board of education members, administrators, teachers from a range of specialties in the school district, students, parents, and community members. Other groups will meet, including one of grade level teachers and staff members to discuss design of the buildings and another of district administrators and maintenance staff to discuss different types of systems, costs, and benefits.


Once September opens, Sol Harris/Day will have developed some design concepts. By the middle of the month, a steering committee of district administrators, teachers, principals, board members, design team members and the construction manager will be in place. This group will discuss the design and talk to local fire and police representatives to review security and access around the site.

We have a large task before us, but we're excited to build new schools that will enhance education for students in the North Canton City School District.

Spring Events for the Class of 2020

On Monday, April 20, Governor DeWine stated, "the gathering of significant numbers of people is a dangerous situation. Just as schools have been innovative in regard to how to teach from a distance, I know that they will be innovative as they look at how...they honor the students. . .." Then the Ohio Department of Education added, "School leaders should conduct graduation ceremonies and other recognition events in a remote manner that honors each student in a safe and responsible way, prioritizing the health needs of students, their families and the community."

Trying to balance the need to protect our community's health and the desire to recognize the outstanding Class of 2020, the high school administration explored ways to make Hoover High School seniors understand how much the staff cares for them. Putting in 12-hour days for weeks, the principals and staff members began with a Senior Salute at Memorial Stadium for five nights from May 4-8 with the lights illuminated at 20:20 military time. Every 20 seconds in alphabetical order on their scheduled night, a senior's name was read and displayed on the scoreboard. *Continued on page 9*

Technology Department



The North Canton City Schools Technology Department is consistently proud of the work we do to support learning in our district. Over the past several years, we have put in place a successful one-to-one Chromebook program in grades K-12, rolled out a top-rated learning management system (LMS) called Schoology, equipped our teachers with versatile laptops and a dependable wireless network, and continue to work toward providing professional development opportunities to successfully integrate technology in our classrooms.

We could not have done this without support from our community through the permanent improvement levy that was passed in 2013. This continuous funding helps ensure that our technology is purposeful, updated, and sustainable.

When the education community found out, with very little lead time, that we would need to completely change our school structure to remote learning because of COVID-19, many school districts had giant obstacles to overcome in order to move forward to meet the needs of students. Some districts only had desktops for teachers in their classrooms instead of laptops that could be easily taken home. Some did not have a learning management

system already in place and struggled to figure out how to communicate with families and provide easy access to materials. Some did not have enough devices to hand out to every student.

In North Canton, our infrastructure and our staff were ready for the challenge because we were already fully engaged with using technology tools in our classrooms. We had video conferencing and digital learning tools that supported communication with students and families, instructional videos recorded by staff as well as links to videos from a variety of resources, online content from curriculum publishers that allowed for continued learning, and Schoology and Google Suite applications that served as the core of our remote learning framework.

This was, without a doubt, stressful on all involved. I would never want to trivialize this experience because I know how difficult it was in some cases as we pushed the limits to extremes. However, I would like to highlight the positives that have come from it. . . almost like enjoying the rainbow after the storm. We learned how much we care about each other, how to be flexible and agile, how to try things we have never tried before, and how fortunate we are to have the tools and support available to keep moving forward even during an unprecedented event.

Did You Know

With the 2019-20 school year just ending, and looking ahead to the 2020-21 school year, I want to share a few pieces of information from this past year and from plans for next school year that you may not be aware of. So here we go . . .

Did you know that all of North Canton's instructional staff in Kindergarten through 2nd grade spent time during each of the three professional development days this past school year learning more about the science of reading? There has been much new scientific research over the past three years that shows that systematic instruction in phonics is key to helping not only at-risk readers, but it's key in helping ALL children learn to read. Most schools nationwide had put less of an emphasis on phonics in core reading instruction in recent years, but now many schools are putting much more of an emphasis on it in their everyday instruction for all students. North Canton City Schools was fortunate to have secured a grant over a year ago that paid for resources for teachers to help them learn more about the science of reading as well as to implement new instructional strategies. If you have a child in grades K to 2 next school year, please ask his/ her teacher about this shift in literacy instruction so you can learn more.

Did you know that North Canton City Schools' preschool at the Mary L. Evans Early Childhood Center had its highest enrollment this past school year over at least the previous eight school years? There were more than 135 preschoolers from ages 3 to 5 enrolled this past year in the integrated preschool which blends students with special needs and typically developing peers. The ECC has five morning classes and five afternoon classes with each class having a teacher licensed as a general education teacher and an intervention specialist in preschool through grade 3 plus one or more education assistants in each class. The ECC has been recognized by the Ohio Department of Education as a 5-star Step Up To Quality Preschool. Our teachers follow

the Ohio Early Learning Standards and Developmental Standards that will help prepare students for Kindergarten and beyond. In addition to the daily age-appropriate instruction in literacy, numeracy, and socialization, all students participate in an art and physical education class every five days. If you are interested in having your child attend preschool, please call the district office at 330-497-5600.

Did you know that the we asked for parents' feedback on how remote learning was for their children, and we received 1,090 responses from parents? Thank you for your feedback! I do want to share a few graphics in case those of you who completed the survey were curious as to how your feedback compared to the overall feedback from all 1,090 who responded. While we are pleased overall with how remote learning went, please know that we prefer to have your children in school with us, but we will do all that we can to improve the remote learning experience for children if we have to do it again in the future-but let's hope we can simply use your feedback to make traditional instruction even better for all students.



Breakdown of the approximate average amount of time spent each day on remote learning schoolwork by students:



Did you know that each year, a portion of the funds generated from the permanent improvement levy that was passed by the community in 2013 is used for the purchase of new textbooks? A lot has changed in textbooks over recent years with almost all textbooks being available online either instead of or in addition to hard copy print. Also, there are now so many more online resources that come along with the textbooks which include video tutorials for students, extra practice, multiple methods of instruction, re-teaching, enrichment, problembased learning, and assessment items to name just a few. For next year, students in the indicated classes will have new textbooks along with the multitude of resources that are being purchased this summer thanks to the permanent improvement funds:

- All 6th, 7th, and 8th grade math classes (last new textbook purchase in 2012)
- All Algebra 1, Geometry, Algebra 2, and AP Calculus classes (last new textbook purchase in 2000)
- All Spanish 1, 2, and 3 classes for high school credit (last new textbook purchase in 2004)
- All French 1, 2, and 3 classes for high school credit (last new textbook purchase in 2004).



Kindergarten Registration

The North Canton City School District is currently enrolling students for kindergarten who will be five years old on or before August 1, 2020. North Canton Middle School seventh-grader, Andrew Stehura, won the school's Geography Bee. Hoover High School's



Members of Educators Rising at Hoover, GlenOak, and Perry high schools donated more than 4,600 books to the Early Childhood Resource Center in Canton.







































Goodbye until August

Orchard Hill School Garden

Orchard Hill parent, **Tricia Calhoun**, came forward with a vision to create a school garden that was not only accessible for all students, but also designed,

planted, and nurtured by students. She wanted children to learn where their food came from, understand sustainability, and get their hands gloriously dirty in the process. With encouragement given from the school, she started on a journey to bring her project to life. She attended a workshop at The Ohio State University and then made connections with the Farm to School Program/Stark County and Orchard Hill teacher **Shannon McPherson**. As a result of Mrs. Calhoun's efforts, the Orchard Hill School Garden was



created and will soon be bearing the fruits (and vegetables) of her labor.



Starting in January, students interested in the school garden met with Mrs. Calhoun and Miss McPherson during an after-school program. They learned about gardening, provided ideas for the garden design, and eventually started working with seeds to prepare for their first crop of winter vegetables. Learning about measuring the distance between plants and the components of germination, they made seed tape using toilet paper and water-soluble glue. Of course, they did not know that within a week of making their seed tape the stay at home orders would be issued and toilet paper would become a scarce resource! To say the least, the children were disappointed that they could not see their project through and see their first crop.



Along with the children, there were community partners who helped to helped to get the project started. Volunteers from the **North Canton Community Garden** provided advice and labor to build the garden beds. **Putting Down Roots Farm to School Program of Stark County** provided a grant to purchase building materials and gardening supplies. We received donations from local businesses including **Fichter Farms**, who donated soaker hoses; and **Know Your Roots**, who donated our seeds. Mohler Lumber provided a discount to help keep the cost of our building materials within budget. The garden also includes a book box donated by *BookShareja* which is part of the Hoover Business Program. Using this box, community members can take or leave a book. The garden also includes a book box where community members can take or leave a book. Without the help of these community partners, the project would not have been possible.

Although the children were not able to plant their seeds, Mrs. Calhoun has remained dedicated to the project and is determined that children will be able to see the garden producing when school starts. Her vision for continued program development will include ongoing after-school enrichment for the school garden club with opportunities for students/families to assist with tending the garden. In addition, school-wide programming will include classes in gardening and sustainability and special taste testing sessions that encourage healthy eating. Mrs. Calhoun also sees the garden as a green space where children can relax, regroup, and feel grounded. In these times with great uncertainty and high anxiety, a school garden is a perfect place to put down roots and watch for the harvest to come.

Thank you to Mrs. Calhoun, Miss McPherson, the school garden club students, and all of our community partners for making this project a reality.

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


YouChoose competed at Nationals

Through Their Eyes

INTERVIEWS CONDUCTED BY HOOVER ASSOCIATE PRINCIPAL ROB WHITE

There are several students who earn their State Tested Nursing Assistant (STNA) license each year at Hoover High School. These students are comprised of seniors from both Lake Middle/ High School and Hoover High School. The students prepare, research, participate in labs and clinicals, and study to take their state test in the winter of their senior year. Hoover High School's program, under the direction of Ms. Angela Combs, has produced outstanding results. For the past three years, students in Hoover's program have passed the STNA test at a rate of 100%! These students who earn their STNA often work at local long-term care facilities during the spring of their senior year and beyond.

This past spring brought the same opportunity as thirteen students earned this license. Again, many worked in local long-term care However, this spring, facilities. students had a completely different experience as they took care of residents living in the midst of a pandemic. They served residents who could not visit with family members. They even provided care for residents afflicted with COVID-19. Several of these students shared some of their experiences. Take a look at the world of work through their eyes.

Describe how you felt going to work as an STNA during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Haleigh W.: Going to work during the pandemic was scary, especially because I was required to be tested for COVID-19. Despite that situation I do enjoy working as an STNA and getting to help people, I love getting to know the residents and form good relationships.

Kaylee T.: It was scary at first knowing about the virus and knowing that the residents I care about are highly susceptible to it, but I had to put that in the back of my head. I knew I had to be there for them since their family couldn't come and see them. I had to be someone they could trust throughout the hard times.

Sydney M.: I was very nervous about working during the COVID-19 pandemic because I did not want to risk the health of my family or friends, but I also knew that it was my responsibility to take care of the residents that are living at my facility.

Grace N.: I was afraid, but I also felt rewarded because I could help residents as a health care professional.

What was rewarding about your work as a medical professional during the COVID-19 pandemic?

Haleigh W.: It feels good that I'm able to continue helping people, especially now when many people are not able to work. Because families have not been able to visit, I'm glad we have such good staff to continue to support our residents.

Kaylee T.: The most rewarding part of my job as an STNA is seeing the residents really start to accept you as part of their family. They start to really trust you and you become the person that they look forward to talk to.

Sydney M.: It is rewarding to see how grateful the residents are for the care I provide them.

Alysha E.: I feel rewarded every day I go to work, even before the virus began. The residents are so grateful for everything we do and with everything that has been happening, it only makes them feel much more appreciated.

Grace N.: The most rewarding part of my job is being with the residents, because they couldn't go out and be with their family. I get close to them and talk with them and try and help them process this challenging time.

Earning an STNA while in high school is very rare. Describe your feelings about earning this license while at such a young age.

Haleigh W.: I am very grateful to have gotten the opportunity to be in this program, but it felt amazing to finally get something after three years of learning the information. At first it can be scary to think that we have a license and are responsible for taking care of people, but the job is so rewarding.

Kaylee T.: I really didn't have the feeling of being accomplished until someone asked me how old I was, and I said, "18." They said, "Wow. You're young. That's amazing!"

Sydney M.: I am very grateful that I earned my license at such a young age because it is a stepping stone into a future career path. Whether I decide to go into the medical field or not, I can use this license to help develop my



communication skills and learn how to care for those who are dependent on others.

Alysha E.: It's definitely not something I thought I would have wanted when I was younger. But, I wouldn't change it. I'm grateful to have a rewarding job that pays well. I earn more than any one my age.

What do you envision as your future career? Do you plan to earn any more certifications or licenses in the next 4 years? If so, what?

Haleigh W.: I'm going to Cleveland State for nursing, so hopefully I will be a nurse. I hope to have my BSN within the next 4 years.

Kaylee T.: I will continue to work in the medical field.

Sydney M.: I envision myself being involved in either public health administration or in the field of business.

Alysha E.: I do not plan on continuing to be a healthcare worker. This experience has made me realize that this isn't what I want for my future but, I'm glad I have this knowledge and experience. I'm already a licensed STNA, licensed in blood borne pathogens, and CPR certified.

Grace N.: Psychiatric Nursing as a Practitioner. I plan to earn my BSN and then an MSN in psychiatry.

How has Hoover High School helped or harmed you in the development of your future plans?

Haleigh W.: I think Hoover is a very good school and has amazing teachers who have helped me.

Kaylee T.: This program has helped me realize I do want to work in the medical field. Sydney M.: Hoover High School has definitely taught me that I have to work hard in order to accomplish my goals. I think that during high school, I challenged myself academically and I am very proud of that.

Alysha E.: I wouldn't say that Hoover harmed me in any future plans. They helped me realize what I want to do with my life and helped me go in the right direction.

Is there anything else you would like to share about your experiences as an STNA this spring?

Haleigh W.: It is a very rewarding job and anyone interested in the medical field should look into this program at Hoover or even taking the curriculum after high school to get your license.

Alysha E.: This job is definitely not pretty. You work long hours, in stressful situations, and with little help. However, it's very rewarding, and the pay is decent.

Grace N.: It definitely wasn't easy, but hardships build strength. Going through this pandemic is a once in a lifetime, historical event.

It should be noted that some of these students served in facilities where residents tested as positive for COVID-19. Almost all of the students interviewed plan to continue working as an STNA this fall. Some will work part-time and some on the weekends, while others plan to continue to work full-time as a STNA. We wish future success for all thirteen of these young ladies. We know that we are in good hands with such capable, well-trained people working in the medical profession. Thank you for your service!
