What is an audit?

The Financial Audit Group of the Ohio Auditor of State's (AOS) office is responsible for conducting financial audits of all public entities as required under Ohio law. Generally, the AOS is required to perform these financial audits at least once every two fiscal years; however, many audits are performed annually. The office must review the methods, accuracy and legality of the accounts, financial reports, records and files of all public entities. It is the responsibility of the Financial Audit Group to determine if the entity has complied with the law, rules, ordinances and orders pertaining to the office. Each fiscal year, the AOS releases approximately 4,000 financial audits.

Audits generally begin with an entrance conference between the lead auditor, audit manager, treasurer, superintendent and school board members. At this meeting the objectives, scope, types of records to be examined, estimate of the time required to complete the audit and cost are reviewed. Once audit field work begins, regular communications occur between the lead auditor and treasurer to keep everyone fully informed of issues and audit progress.

Audit field work includes testing for compliance with district policies and applicable laws, as well as examining the effectiveness and existence of internal control procedures.

The audit process ends with an exit conference, which is held to review the audit report, field work results and any recommendations the AOS makes to strengthen the district's financial operations.

Each year the AOS issues an "Auditor of State Award" to entities that meet the following criteria of a "clean" audit report:

- The entity must file timely financial reports with the Auditor of State's office in accordance with GAAP (Generally Accepted Accounting Principles);
- The audit report does not contain any findings for recovery, material citations, material weaknesses, significant deficiencies, Single Audit findings or questioned costs;
- The entity's management letter contains no comments related to: Ethics referrals, questioned costs less than \$10,000, lack of timely report submission, reconciliation, failure to obtain a timely Single Audit, findings for recovery less than \$100 or public meetings or public records
- The entity has no other financial or other concerns

The audit of the North Canton City School District for 2016-2017 has been completed with great success, and we have again received the "Auditor of State Award." I am very proud of the staff in the treasurer's office for their diligent work every day to ensure the safeguarding of all district resources. I appreciate every staff member's compliance with board policies and procedures. This total team effort shows the dedication to the students and families of this great district.

Board of Education looking ahead to November

The NCCS Board of Education voted Wednesday, June 21, to send a Resolution of Necessity to the county and state department of taxation. In responding to this resolution, they will set the tax rate or millage rate necessary to raise the specified amount of money through an earned income tax for district operations and a bond issue for a facility project. The auditors will then respond in ten days with the information, and Board of Education members will then decide in July if they wish to place the issue on the November ballot.

The school district has never placed an Earned Income Tax (EIT) on the ballot, relying instead on property tax levies. The proposed master facility project was designed with input from a steering committee,

community members, students, staff and administration over the last several months. For a detailed look at the process, go to <http://www.dejongrichter.com/nccs/>.

Superintendent Jeff Wendorf explained that the district must carefully consider both needs of the district. "Both items are equally important. If we don't have more funding, we will be forced to reduce staff. If we don't take care of our facilities, we'll face a number of problems maintaining them." He elaborated on the choice of an earned income tax. "We feel it is important to have another source of revenue rather than relying solely on property taxes. The school district earned income tax would mean that those school district residents who have an active income would be responsible for this tax."

What is an Earned Income Tax?

Retirees and unemployed residents do not pay. Only those residents actively EARNING a paycheck will pay. Pensions, income from retirement savings, rental property income and social security income will not be touched. Only earned income. Professional Development

The school year for most students has concluded, but the administration and faculty of the North Canton City Schools are continuing their own education with some outstanding professional development.

On June 5-6, sixteen staff members and administrators from NCCS attended the *Positive Behavior Intervention Support (PBIS) Level 2* training at Stark State College.

From June 12 – 14, seven NCCS staff members and administrators attended the *All In Institute* at R.G. Drage, sponsored by State Support Team Region 9. The focus was inclusive proactive teaching practices and strategies that provide the support that struggling learners need in core instruction. This practice is much better for these students who are often provided intervention only after they have demonstrated failure or difficulty to learn concepts. Three well-known national presenters were part of the facilitation team. The individuals were Brooke Haycock, from the Education Trust; Markeda Newell, from Loyola University; and Jon Saphier, from Research for Better Teaching.

Hoover High School was the host site for three professional development events for teachers and administrators from all districts served by the Stark County ESC or State Support Team Region 9. At the June 15 program on *High Impact Teaching Strategies Conference for Teachers*, 364 attendees gathered to hear Jon Saphier, a national presenter and the founder and president of Research for

Better Teaching. Saphier has been studying and researching the teaching strategies of teachers within schools who consistently obtain better than average growth from ALL students for more than 30 years. He has been sharing his findings from his research on and work with such teachers with teachers and administrators all over the United States. The website for his organization is <http://www.rbteach.com>. This program was attended by about 50 NCCS staff members. In addition, the afternoon sessions were recorded by Hoover High School Video Productions students, which will give teachers, who were unable to attend the sessions, an opportunity to view the valuable workshop.

On June 16 Jon Saphier offered a presentation, *Supporting High Impact Teaching Strategies for Administrators*, to over 150 administrators from Stark County and nearby districts. All administrators from North Canton City Schools attended. Saphier addressed how administrators can support teachers to ensure high impact teaching.

The final day was for Stark County math and science teachers regarding the STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics)

Initiative. Eighty teachers, including eight teachers from North Canton City Schools, attended. There were feature speakers, breakout sessions, and the opportunity for teaching teams to collaborate on work for the next school year.

On June 19 North Canton Middle School (NCMS) science teachers participated in an all-day training on how to use Gizmos, which is a product from Explore Learning that includes interactive online science simulations that are aligned to science standards. The training, offered by one of Explore Learning's consultants who came in from Texas, provided insights to our teachers on how to use Gizmos in additional ways to make more real life connections for students to the content that they learn.

Also, on June 19 NCMS English Language Arts teachers collaboratively planned for the 2017-18 school year. Their focus was the utilization of a new online curriculum from Pearson Learning called "My Perspectives," which all teachers and students at NCMS will have access to this fall. This day was a follow-up to previous professional development that the teachers had during May with a Pearson training consultant.

A Legacy to Remember

Laura Blandine, a teacher at Greentown Intermediate School, was selected by the school district for the Master Teacher Award from the Martha



Holden Jennings Foundation. In conjunction with this recognition, she was awarded the Excellence in Teaching Grant under the Master Teacher Award category from the Foundation. This grant for \$3,000 will fund her project about the Hoover Company and the impact it and its family members had

on the North Canton community. The project, "A Legacy to Remember," is a collaboration with Denise Boyd, the Greentown art teacher.

The funding will be used to purchase a kiln and a kiln furniture kit to allow students to design a captivating clay mural of the Hoover Company. It is a creative, motivating project which encourages multidisciplinary learning through art, local history, and math.

Mrs. Blandine explained the task students will face, "The construction of the mural will involve a complex artistic process that includes creative

thinking, problem-solving, and use of artistic skills as students strategically integrate the multi-step process. Students will need to break down a picture of the Hoover Company in a puzzle like fashion. They will then duplicate their portion of the picture with clay. The clay pieces will then be fired in the kiln, and then returned to the students for painting, sealing, and assembly."

"Prior to, and during the construction of the mural, students will be learning about the history of our community, the Hoover Company, and the impact the

Hoover Family had on our community. In addition, as students reassemble the mural, they will calculate the area of given rectilinear figures as well as the perimeter of the structure. Students will need to communicate with each other, work cooperatively, and problem-solve as they design and reassemble their portion of the tiles to create this mural."

This historic mural will be created in one grade level, but the kiln will benefit all students in the building.

Youth Mental Health First Aid

Recently, North Canton City Schools provided an open training on youth mental health first aid. **Terri Simmons**, school counselor and mental health clinical counselor, and **Steve Fricke**, school psychologist, provided the training. Participants included parents, teachers and staff from local churches, libraries and social service agencies. They were engaged in training focusing on the signs and symptoms of mental health, as well as strategies to assist those in need using a researched-based action plan/model. There has been an alarming increase in the identification of youth



experiencing mental health concerns, but research shows that early detection and treatment of mental disorders can have a significant impact on the lives of young people. Together, we are proactively working to provide the necessary help, strategies, care and

hope that is greatly needed in so many of today's youth. Future trainings will continue to be offered through the North Canton City School District. For more information, please contact Terri Simmons at 330-497-5635.

Hunger: The Bus Stops Here!

The Stark County Educational Service Center joined forces with its member school districts to raise money and collect food to donate to the Akron Canton Regional Foodbank as part of the Harvest for Hunger Campaign. According to Campaign Specialist Stephanie Knori, "As part of the Stark County ESC *Hunger: The Bus Stops Here!* food collection, we received a total of 29,296 pounds and \$11,964 which will provide 72,269 meals! The pounds received through this food drive were the single-largest collaborative collection for the Harvest for Hunger campaign this year."

The collection of food and money by the students, staff and administration of North Canton City Schools was

very successful as the district was given a Bronze Award for its efforts. Ms. Knori shared the results of the district's donations. "North Canton City Schools donated 2,400 pounds of food. With 1.2 pounds providing enough food for one meal and one dollar providing four meals, the total donation received from NCCS will provide enough food for 2,968 meals! WOW—this is incredible!"

Through the annual Harvest for Hunger campaign, the Akron Canton Regional Foodbank received 134,839 pounds of food and \$1,262,933. Ms. Knori explained the meaning of the campaign. "These donations will provide 5,169,498 meals for our neighbors in need."

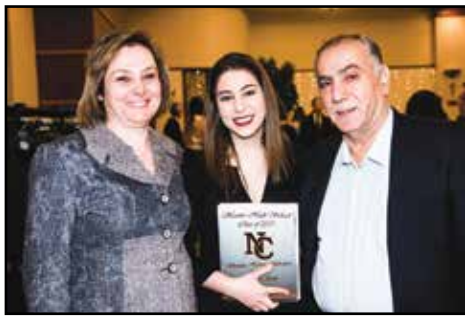

In May students from Hoover High School's business program competed against students from other high schools in two separate competitions. Academic Challenge

North Canton Middle School's Academic Challenge team went 10-0 this season. Thirteen students from grades six-eight participated in the program. The Academic Challenge Advisor, Cathleen Billig, held tryouts in November. Tryouts involved a test over the areas of knowledge covered in the program, including English grammar, literature, math, science, geography, history, current events, and general knowledge. Practices were then held twice weekly until the season began in mid-January. In practice, students improved their speed, determined areas of strength, and learned to work together. The team played 40 rounds this season and won 30 of them. Each round consists of 25 questions over a range of topics, and to win a meet, a team must win three of five rounds. Ten seconds are allotted to answer each question, unless it is a math question, in which case 15 seconds are allotted.

Ms. Billig was impressed by the commitment of team members. "Some

team members made significant sacrifices to be on the team, such as giving up Ski Club for the year due to scheduling conflicts, and rearranging after-school schedules, and missing partial or entire practices for other activities. The team was well-balanced, and students brought a wide range of knowledge and skills to the competition table, drawing on their individual experiences in academics, as well as music, theater, travel, movies and sports. We played ten teams, all from Stark County, until the season ended in March. Parent and NCCS support, as always, was crucial to team success, and the team is most grateful for the efforts on their behalf by both parents and the school district."
