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#### A note from our superintendent...

Thank you to our dedication of our teachers, entire staff, and coaches! We have an incredible family here – within our school employees and throughout our community.

As we conclude a very difficult school year - with administrative changes, others taking new leadership positions/promotions in other districts, colleagues retiring, staff RIFs, continued school finance and unfunded mandate battles, school threats, losing one of our beloved employees to conclude the year, and several conflicts and struggles we conclude this year knowing that we have done right by our students in preparing our students today for tomorrow's opportunities

The accomplishments this year are many: successfully supporting an additional 116 students through graduation, creating the first (and very successful) STEM Preschool in Ohio, securing over \$100,000.00 again in grants and foundation supports, creating the state approved Pre-Apprenticeship Program (rare for a traditional high school), extremely successful fine arts programs, students traveling to Georgia for Solar Sprint Car national competition, students traveling to Dallas for National HOSA Health Field competition, another successful state science fair showing, winning e-Cyber Mission projects at the state level, continued Agricultural Science state and national success, strong student achievement test scores, last October being the first school district invited to present at the State School Board Meeting, and the list goes on.

## <u>School Safety & Security – an update</u>

We will hold a second School Safety and Security Community Forum on June 25th from 6:00PM – 7:00PM in the Northwestern HS Library (note this date has been changed from June 18th due to the Board Meeting date being rescheduled).

The purpose of this meeting is to provide an update of what we have completed, what is in process, and future considerations regarding school safety and to possibly enlist focused financial planning and support for a school resource officer for the 18-19SY.

This meeting immediately precedes our monthly Northwestern Board of Education meeting.

Northwestern has and will continue with our proactive approach to school safety, security, and potential violent or explosive situations.

We have been working with the Wayne County Sheriff's Dept. and Wayne County Commissioners the past two months on a proposal for a shared SRO (School Resource Officer), which would be a Deputy Sheriff with ongoing significant training. The proposal is that an SRO would be employed and utilized as Northwestern SRO during the school year and an active on the road Deputy in the summer months. The Wayne County Sheriff's Dept. would receive \$30,000 in funding from the Wayne County Commissioners, which would cover an est. 1/3 of the total cost. This agreement would reduce our costs for the SRO and still serve the school needs. The district's cost for the SRO would be over \$50,000 (training, salary, insurance, equipment, vehicle, and other costs). The district would be very grateful for any financial support from community and businesses for this added cost. We should have word on this prior to our June 18th meeting. We are finalizing the contract details and job description for a June agreement.

We have also been working in collaboration with other superintendents and the Tri-County ESC for months on a county-wide (or possibly a three-county) 1 mil levy that would be utilized for school safety and security.

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#### SCHOOL SAFETY, CONTINUED .....

We have proposed the collected revenue to be distributed by enrollment, but could be either distributed to schools by enrollment or by dollars collected locally for each district. Should this 1 mil levy pass in November we would not begin receiving this revenue until July 2019. This is why we need financial support for this upcoming 2018-2019 school year – during this transition year.

#### What Northwestern has done since January, 2018:

- Expanded and increased Counseling and Therapy, and Family Counseling Services through and within Northwestern Schools
- Added a third organization to provide additional services Family Counseling out of Mansfield
   in addition to services provided by Catholic Charities and ANAZAO
- Peer supports HS to upper ES students (training through ANAZAO)
- Positive Behavior Supports (PBIS) refresher and more intensive training
- Numerous staff discussions regarding school safety and security
- Continued anti-bullying efforts
- Continued efforts focusing on individual student needs and climate/family issues especially
  anger management, self-esteem, relationships, and resiliency
- Wayne County Bullying Conference (Mrs. Beun has taken an active role and was a panel members and speaker for this spring county-wide event as well)
- Updated and replaced several security cameras
- Provided Staff "Unarmed Self-Defense training" in an intruder situation for staff in all three buildings voluntarily
- Purchased and distributed pepper spray to administrators, secretaries, custodians, interested bus drivers, and other key employees
- Purchased magnetic door lock pads for classroom doors
- Replacement of MS Entrance Security Camera system

#### Efforts in Process (in place by August, 2018 or early fall):

- Employment of a Full-Time School Year School Resource Officer for Northwestern
- 1% county-wide levy to fund the SRO and ongoing School Safety & Security measures
- Peer supports recent graduates & strong leaders interacting with MS students (training through ANAZAO)
- MS Building Door reinforcements (incl. smoked replacement glass, reinforcements, etc.)
- Involvement in the "Stop the Bleed" initiative (emergency response and anti-hemorrhage discussions, logistics, training)
- Planning School Bus Training in August
- Adding security cameras to our new school van (we already have multiple cameras on every school bus)
- Studying additional secondary door lock systems for classrooms
- Add an additional 3 Security Cameras on campus
- Continued anti-bullying initiatives
- Applied for and received funding for a District office base MARCS radio unit (this is in addition to the base radio we had purchased three years ago for each school building note that we have had numerous walky-talkies throughout the district for several years as well
- Providing more comprehensive Staff "Unarmed Self-Defense training" in an intruder situation for all staff during Sept. 2018 professional development days

SRO monitoring of social media SRO educating through DARE program-

ming

- Continuation of current initiatives and ongoing discussions
- Purchasing additional direct intercom phones to reach the entire building in emergency
- Expanded access of our security cameras to Sheriff Dept. Deputies on their electronic devices
- Mandate that all Secondary exits remain locked and secured – no propping or unlocking of doors

Future efforts (these are items we are pursuing, but whether due to cost, degree of impact, additional time needed, labor needed, or logistics cannot occur sooner). We will be pursuing these as able, but with passage of a safety & security levy these can surely be pursued in summer 2019 and beyond:

- MS Door replacements and additional reinforcements
- Entrance bulletproof glass coating
- Installation of additional security cameras TBD
- Install a gate across the NE corner of the HS Building across to the storage building and fencing to secure the back of the HS
- Improved security to secondary exits through cameras, peepholes, and alarms
- Software to potentially scan social media for key phrases, threats, and self-harm
- Multi-directional signal boosters for MARCs handheld radios
- We are searching for additional school safety, opioid, or DARE officer content, if we can qualify for grant money

As I have shared before, the very best deterrent is many situations is forging and maintaining strong relationships and communications with staff, students, and parents; addressing mental health and behavioral issues, dealing with any bullying behavior immediately, as well as providing additional counseling supports for students and families as provided with existing staff, Catholic Charities, ANAZAO, families, and local clergy. The \$41,000 grant we have received for these counseling agencies to work with our students most in need in all of our school buildings through Wayne County JFS through Title XX funds as approved by the Wayne County Commissioners has been a much needed additional support for our children each of the past 3 years.

The district has put together a comprehensive plan for cost Reduction Measures and taken action on many of the measures this spring. Due to financial constraints we were forced to RIF several positions and we incorporated numerous cost reduction items that will reduce the projected budget by hundreds of thousands of dollars. However, do not confuse this with "saving" hundreds of thousands of dollars, because our costs continue to increase in spite of these measures. With employee salaries and health insurance, special education, growing costs of technology, as well as sizeable HVAC replacement costs and flat-lined state funding our expenditures continue to grow. We will continue working on ways of tightening our belts as far as reducing expenditures and generating additional revenue as we move forward.

Congratulations to Spanish students from Northwestern High School who attained national recognition for excellent performance on the 2018 National Spanish Examinations.

"Attaining a medal or honorable mention for any student on the National Spanish Examinations is very prestigious," said Kevin Cessna-Buscemi, National Director of the Exams, "because the exams are the largest of their kind in the United States with over 150,000 students participating in 2018." The students from Northwestern High School earning awards this year are Spencer Garrison (Level 4 Bronze), Nik King (Level 3 Gold) and Kaitlyn Secrist (Level 3 Honorable mention).

The National Spanish Examination, sponsored by the American Association of Teachers of Spanish and Portuguese, was administered this year for the first time in Spanish 3 and 4.

Things have slowed down here at Northwestern High School giving us time to reflect on the past school year and begin preparations for the coming year as well.

Congratulations to the Class of 2018 for their collective success. Going in to the end of the school year our graduating class had more than \$1,750,000 pledged in grants and scholarships which will be applied to their post-secondary education.

Juliet Thomas, NHS Guidance Counselor, has provided the following information on this class

- \* 72 students -63% intend to enter a 2 or 4-year College.
- \* 7 students -6% intend to enter a branch of the Military
- \* 36 students 31% intend to enter the work force.

I am very proud of this group of young men and women and look forward to seeing and hearing of their accomplishments in the next phase of their lives. The Mission of the Northwestern School District is "Preparing Our Students Today for Tomorrow's Opportunities". The Class of 2018 has lived up to the expectations of their school, family and community and are prepared for the opportunities that lie ahead.

Looking to the 2018 – 19 school year, we have continued our quest to adjust and upgrade our curriculum. Next school year will be the first year for capstone classes in the Clean Energy and Computer Science career pathways. Another focus has been to adjust our delivery of CCP classes. Next year we will have four CCP classes in English, two in Math, two in Social Studies, two in Science, one in Music, several in Business, one in Teacher Education and numerous opportunities via the Agricultural Science program.

# Northwestern High School News

We understand that there are options for students and decisions to be made. In the end, there are positive and negative aspects for all choices. The high school cannot be a college and a college cannot be a high school.

As of the present time, with the exception of some shifting of staff due to economic issues, this is the first time in my tenure that all staff members are returning. There were no retirements and no new hires at the high school. With all people returning we will certainly be in a position to hit the ground running when the new school year begins.

A couple of days ago I was in a conversation with a staff member who previously worked at the high school and is now returning. We drifted on to a conversation about a story that many of you have probably already heard, but I think it is worth sharing as it really captures and reminds us of an important aspect of the potential positive impact we can all have on others. The story is most often referenced as the Starfish Story, with the following being one of my favorite versions:

Once upon a time, there was an old man who used to go to the ocean to do his writing. He had a habit of walking on the beach every morning before he began his work. Early one morning, he was walking along the shore after a big storm had passed and found the vast beach littered with starfish as far as the eye could see, stretching in both directions.

# Anxiety, Bullying, and Children by Rachel Beun Middle School Assistant Principal

On May 3, 2018, Wayne County's Family and Children First Council and Anazao Community Partners invited a panel of professionals to speak at a community forum focused on issues related to childhood anxiety and bullying. The panel consisted of a cross-section of area agencies and school personnel, which included representation from Wooster City and Northwestern Local Schools, as well as, the Wayne County prosecutor, a community mental health professional, a youth pastor, and a school resource officer. The panel fielded questions from the audience, offering guidance and suggestions to families and students.

As a participant on the panel, I appreciated hearing the commitment to our area students and families, both from a safety standpoint and in regards to mental health. Each panelist shared knowledge based on their experiences with child-hood anxiety and bullying. Despite their diverse backgrounds, each person had experiences with handling students who had faced anxiety and/or bullying behaviors. Each panelist was able to share his or her personal experiences and offered potential solutions for handling these types of issues and concerns.

Based on the expertise from several of the panelists, the definition of bullying was reviewed. Bullying involves one person intentionally causing harm to another person. Typically, the victim is someone who has difficulty defending him/herself, showing an imbalance of power between the bully and the victim. In addition, these bullying behaviors tend to occur over time or repeatedly. The "bullying" term can be overused and misunderstood, often becoming the term used to describe all mean or unkind behaviors. In order to constitute bullying, these three conditions will be present. Of course, despite whether it is a bullying situation or students being mean to one another, working together with the school to determine solutions and to provide support is suggested.

A second big conversational point was the nature of the parent relationship with their children. As parents, we are our child's biggest supporters, as well as, advocates. As one of the panelists put it, parents need to become "good students of their children." Take time to listen to your child's perspective, engage in conversations, ask questions, and provide ideas and suggestions to them. Also, study your child and his or her reactions to events. Be mindful of their emotions and behaviors on a regular basis. This includes being aware of their presence and behaviors on social media, as well. In addition, be aware that children are watching for their parents' reactions to determine acceptable behaviors and coping skills. If parents are unhappy about something and decide to "vent" on social media, their children may follow this example. Remember, our children are continuously looking for feedback and models of appropriate and acceptable behavior. Even when children seem as if they are becoming more independent and pushing away from adults, they still require love, guidance, and a listening ear to help them through tough experiences and decisions. Clearly, each of these elements are easily found in a strong parent-child relationship.

Perhaps, one of the most important themes discussed, which was communicated throughout the night with each question and answer, was the necessity of a strong relationship between families and the schools. We, as parents and as educators, are entrusted in the care and safety of our children.

Our partnership and trust in one another is necessary in order to best support our children, as well as, to help hold them accountable for their behaviors and choices. During the school-year, if you or your child have concerns, questions, and/or experiences that need to be addressed or that may require assistance, please connect and communicate with school personnel. Through this communication, students can be provided the best wrap-around services and support system.

No matter what your child is experiencing, it is important to know that there are various school personnel and community agencies available to provide support and services. As the saying goes, "it takes a village to raise a child," remember that each of us need to rely on others to offer suggestions, recommendations, and support. Because we are talking about issues with our own children, it is easy for our emotions to become heightened, which may cloud our view or our ability to make decisions. I referred this to the "Mama Bear" and "Papa Bear" reactions. Reaching out to others help to ground us, provides us with other ideas, opinions, and options, and provides us with an additional support network for both our children and ourselves. As many of us know, it hurts when we see our kids hurt. Allow others to intervene and offer help.

As one of the panelists at this event, a school administrator, and a parent, I want to reiterate how fortunate we are to live in a community that cares so much for children. As I mentioned previously, it was amazing to see the interaction of these different individuals (and the institutions they represented). Each of the panelists spoke to the care, support, and services they offer to children and families in order to best meet the safety, behavioral, and social-emotional needs of our children. I encourage each of you to embrace these services, should you find yourself needing support. Anyone wanting to discuss the topics of childhood anxiety and/or bullying further should contact the school administration and/or guidance counselors in your child's respective buildings. Additional resource information can also be obtained from the school and community mental health agencies and professionals.





The Northwestern FFA Chapter would like to congratulate these dedicated members for their hard work in the contests and would like to wish those who advanced good luck at the next level.






