## **Poetry Idea**

This poem is called a pantoum, one of my favorite poetry forms (I've used it in *Butterfly Eyes* and *This Is Just to Say*). You might notice how repetitive it is. In a pantoum, the second and fourth lines of a stanza are repeated as the first and third of the next stanza. You are allowed to cheat slightly on the wording of lines if you wish. Most classical pantoums rhyme in an *a-b-a-b* pattern, but mine usually don't.

- 1. Choose a subject that you think a lot about (maybe even obsess over).
- 2. Start with a very simple statement that sums up how you feel about this subject: "Chocolate is my favorite sin." This first line will also be your last line, because in a

pantoum, the first and third lines of the first stanza are flipped to be the second and fourth lines of the last stanza. Are you freaking out about now? Don't. Please keep going—it's really fun.

- 3. Brainstorm some other simple phrases about your subject. "It is never far from my thoughts." "So smooth and melty." "All shapes and sizes."
- 4. Play around with them a bit, then start forming your first stanza, knowing that you'll be repeating the second and fourth in the next stanza. Keep going, playing around with the order of the lines. Then use your first and third lines and the second and last lines of your last stanza. It practically writes itself!!

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
