News From The Superintendent

It is hard to believe that this school year is coming to a close on June 20th. This has been a year of transition for the Pioneer School District as we have hired so many new staff as well as placing existing staff in new roles. We currently have 137 employees in the District and of those, 46 are new to the District.

As we begin reviewing this school year, I look back at the many initiatives and accomplishments our District has provided to improve teaching and learning in our District.

First off, our building principals are all new to their roles this year in the District. They have embraced their roles and provided leadership to the staff and students that has helped change the culture and climate in each building. We have new staff at the district level in Human Resources, Payroll, Accounts Payable, and Special Education. These employees have done a great job this year in those roles, helping to establish our protocols and procedures to ensure we are compliant with state and federal guidance.

We also welcomed new teachers and paraeducators to our District that work directly with our students. Each one has contributed to the success we have experienced this year. They blended well with our returning staff to create an environment that is conducive to student success. We anticipate this next year to have 4-5 new teachers and 3-4 new paraeducators to replace those staff who are leaving our District. We do expect a strong candidate pool to fill these positions as Pioneer is continuing to work on being a school district where people want to come and work. Some of the initiatives we have introduced and continue to develop are our Character Strong in our Social Emotional Learning arena, Professional Learning Communities for monitoring student academic progress, lesson development, and reviewing our standards-based curriculum.

Our District Leadership Team, comprised of

certified and classified staff as well as a parent and school board member, have been working on the development of a Strategic Plan for the District, which will guide our work over the next five years. Each building created a Building Leadership Team that focuses on issues in the building, including evaluation process, climate and culture, and best practices in working with student behaviors that sometimes impede student learning.

As we look to the future, we will have a new reading curriculum for our elementary school next year. A team of teachers researched the best evidence-based curriculums, visited schools that use these reading programs, and recommended CKLA (Core Knowledge Language Arts). We also will have a new middle school social studies curriculum.

This next year, we will be looking at adopting a new K-8 math curriculum as well as a progress-monitoring tool that will assess student learning. We also will be expand our Professional Learning Communities to take a deeper dive into student progress, interventions in reading and math, and continue to address our instructional practices. Our social-emotional curriculum, Character Strong, will be fully implemented next year, including behavior interventions that will help our students learn how to better resolve conflict, take responsibility, and build upon their abilities to solve problems and advocate for themselves.

Lastly, I again want to thank the community for supporting our levy election in February. This will help stabilize our funding over the coming years

and allow us to continue moving forward in the education of children in the Pioneer School District.

Have a wonderful summer and we will see you when school resumes in September.

Teacher Feature Kamala Budge



Mrs. Budge has been teaching for six years at Pioneer. She currently is teaching 4th grade. Prior to coming to Pioneer, Mrs. Budge taught at Mountain View Elementary as a Fine Arts Specialist. She also was the Site Coordinator for the 21st Century Grant through ESD 113 at Oakland Bay Junior

High and Olympic Middle School. In this role, Mrs. Budge ran after-school programs, summer academics, and enrichment programs.

When asked what brought her to Pioneer, Mrs. Budge replied that her husband, Bracken, was hired as a counselor, then interim principal. At that time, the District needed a science specialist midyear and since her husband had fallen in love with Pioneer and the staff, she applied for that position and has stayed here ever since. Mrs. Budge was influenced in becoming a teacher by two "fantastic" science teachers at Garfield High School, Mr. McGowen, who taught Marine Biology, and Mrs. Valentine, who taught Genetics. She said, "they were rigorous classes that tapped into my visual and kinesthetic learning style. Everything was hands-on and project-based".

Elementary School STEM News

We've had a hectic few months in the Eagle Garden with the elementary STEM classes. In March, we began preparing our raised beds for our coolweather crops by clearing them of winter crops rye and vetch. We also spent a significant amount of time planting cold-weather crops like peas, carrots, lettuce, radishes, arugula, and spinach. In addition, we planted many varieties of tomatoes and basil that were put onto heating mats indoors and then placed under grow lights to give them a good headstart before planting in the ground when the weather warms up. In April, we were lucky enough to receive a rather large donation of native plants from the Mason County Conservation District. Elementary students planted many of the plants including Oregon Grape and Kinikinik among others near our new outdoor learning pavilions.

We continue to work on planting in our garden. Students have been learning about companion plantings such as asparagus with strawberries and using peas and green beans to grow vertically up an arbor. We are learning how to mulch plants to retain necessary water, and how to appropriately water plants too. We are excitedly preparing for our Garden and Games Night.

Earth Day Native Planting At Pioneer Middle School



In preparation for Earth Day this year, Grady Graham from Americorps along with Jen Thurman-Williams from Mason Conservation District (MCD) and WSU

master gardeners Laurie Williams and Amelia Savinova were here on April 12 to facilitate planting native plants around the Eagle's Garden, green belt and walking trails. Pioneer Middle School teachers, Coral Shelly Warren, Brenda Roth, and Megan Thurston took all of the 220 students in grades 6th, 7th, and 8th outside to remove the scotch broom and replace it with native plants. Over 700 native plants were purchased through RCO Outdoor Learning Grant by Mason Conservation District.

Students removed an impressive amount of scotch broom, an invasive species that when left unchecked can overtake large areas of disturbed landscapes. Scotch broom offers little to no benefit to native wildlife and pollinators. On

average the plants have 10,000 seeds per plant that can remain viable for 30 years making it a constant fight to keep it away. Students replaced the scotch broom with native plants such as Osoberry, Red Flowering Currant, Pacific Ninebark, and many more. By planting these species, we are helping rewild our green spaces which benefits our local wildlife and provides learning experiences for our students.

If you have a scotch broom problem at home or want to incorporate native plants into your landscape, Mason Conservation District has resources available to you. Mason Conservation District rents out the tool we used to remove the scotch broom for free. Check it out at masoncd.org and keep an eye out for their native plant sale this upcoming winter.



Third Grade Students

Third graders sprang right into scientific discovery immediately after spring break. The Pacific Shellfish Institute got them up and moving as they investigated shellfish in our region. Students learned about phytoplankton in the water, classified shells, and then ended with an up-close look at phytoplankton under microscopes.

Elementary Girls On The Run Program

Girls in third, fourth, and fifth grades had the opportunity to participate in a program called Girls on the Run. We filled two teams with a total of 30 girls completing the season.

Girls on the Run is a program that empowers girls! Some of the lessons that the girls participate in include standing up to bullying, being a good friend, what to do when we experience hardships, and how to be courageous. Each practice includes a lesson and a workout. The girls have been working all season to increase their endurance, so they are able to run a 5K at the end of the season.

Elementary Book Vending Machine

At the Elementary School this year we have been working hard to increase our Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS) at the school-wide level. This has included bringing Eagle Assemblies back, celebrating our students of the month who are chosen based on our Character Strong curriculum traits, and introducing SOARtificates. SOARtificates are given to students exhibiting Safe, Organized, Accountable, and/or Respectful behaviors around the school and are turned in each Friday for a weekly drawing where two students from each grade receive prizes.



Recognizing the importance of celebrating students making the right choices, and wanting to foster a love of reading, we decided to invest in a book vending machine that was delivered to the school in early April. Our Friday SOARtificate drawing winners now receive a token that they can use to "buy" a book of their choice from the machine. Student response to the machine has been overwhelmingly positive, with students eager for their names to be drawn to earn a book. Our hope is that throughout the school year, every student will have the opportunity to earn at least one book from the machine.

Our focus this year in our food service department is building our scratch-cooking recipes. We were fortunate to host Chef Kent with our food service staff and deliver a scratch-made meal.
