February 2024 Superintendent Message

I want to wish all of you a very Happy New Year and hope that 2024 is off to a great start for you and your families. Whether you have children in our schools or you live in our community, each year brings a renewed hope that this year will be better than the last.

The Pioneer School District is committed to continuous growth and improvement in everything we do. Our focus continues to be finding ways to reach each and every student so that they can experience academic growth and success. This is and has been our commitment to our community. We continue to set goals, look for innovative methods of delivering our standards-based curriculum, and provide our staff with the support they need to be successful when working with our students. Each new year brings hope for a brighter and better future for the students and families we serve.

I want to thank all of you for your patience during our recent weather events. Winter is always a difficult time when the weather changes and we are faced with making decisions about whether to delay or cancel school. When making the decision, we look at different areas of our district where our students live and our buses travel. Different staff are contacted who live in those areas to report road conditions. We also look at weather forecasts by the hour to see what might be happening during the remainder of the day. Our number one priority is the safety of our students and our staff. We never want to put our students or staff in danger due to travel conditions, both with our buses and with our parents/guardians and staff who have to drive in this weather. Whenever possible, we will work to delay school a couple of hours so at least our bus drivers can drive when it is light. If roads become impassable, we then will make the decision to close schools for the day and make up that day(s) at the end of the year. We also try to make the decision early enough in the morning to allow our families to make decisions

on what to do when their children are not in school. Again, our top priority is the safety of our students, staff, and families.

The Legislature is now in session for their 60day "short" session. There are a number of bills that have been introduced pertaining to education. Our Superintendents in ESD 113 meet weekly to get updates from our legislative lobbyist, who represents the 44 schools that comprise our ESD. We get up-to-the minute progress on bills and discuss what impact they may have on our school districts. As a group of educational leaders, we continue to support fully funding special education, increasing transportation allocations to cover the true cost of transporting students to and from school, and providing continuing professional development for all staff who work with our students. The session is scheduled to end in March, so it will be interesting to see what bills pass that may impact our work in our schools.

Last year, we adopted a new reading curriculum for grades K-5, with training and implementation this current school year. This year, we have a committee looking at our math curriculum for grades K-8. The committee is currently reviewing these options and will make a recommendation to the Board for adoption for next school year. We will make every effort to have parental input once the recommendation has been made and invite anyone who wants to review the math curriculum a chance to come in and take a look.

As we continue to look for ways to improve our school district, I am always looking for community and parental input on programs that benefit our students. If you have ideas, please

feel free to visit with me to share your thoughts. My door is always open and welcome ideas from all stakeholders.

Mrs. Roth has been teaching at Pioneer Middle School for seven years. Prior to coming to the Eagle Family, she taught middle school science and computer science in Las Vegas. She has also taught in Montana and Wyoming. While

I was rethinking my major when he popped his head through the door and suggested a career in education. He said, "with your school experiences...think of the positive impact you could have on thousands of kids just like you..." The next day, after some deep talks and careful consideration, I officially applied to become part of the UNLV's College of Education and never looked back!"


SALMON IN THE SCHOOLS PROGRAM

Third grade chose to participate in the Salmon in the Schools program this year. This means that we are hosting salmon in a fish tank within our school, and we will be watching their growth from egg to adult. Near the end of March, we will travel to Kennedy Creek to release them into the natural habitat they belong in.

We started out with a field trip to Kennedy Creek in December to watch the spawning salmon. While we were there, we learned about their life cycle and habitat. We were able to view salmon and even dissect them at the end. On January 8th, we received our salmon eggs for our tank. It was very exciting to see them in egg form, but what was even more exciting was the fact that they were hatching as she was putting them in the tank! Now we have many alevin that have moved on from the egg stage of life. We will be closely observing them as they continue their life cycle until it is time to say goodbye in March."







Pioneer School District Historic Orchard



In September, the grant request sent to Western Cascade Fruit Society was funded to start the project off. More funding sources are being explored to cover other costs.

our new trees, the best possible start in life, soil samples were taken from the orchard area, garden area, and a control area as samples to base any improvements on. The soil samples were taken to Thurston County Conservation District for analysis. The soil in the orchard turned out to be extremely acidic and lacking in some nutrients and needs to be amended. The project will improve the orchard's soil for two years with cover crops and other amendments to give the trees the best possible start.

The soil was tilled in October, and dolomite lime was added to the soil per the recommendations for the first year from the soil analysis and then the cover crops were seeded and have since emerged. We hope to till the cover crop in April and apply Crimson Clover for the summer. The cover crop seeds bought for the project are Austrian winter peas, cereal rye/vetch, coated crimson clover seed. There is a fine crop of rocks as well!

ELEMENTARY STEM UPDATE

The last few months have been very busy in Elementary STEM. Students have learned basic coding skills, including directional, binary, if-then, and coordinate coding. Kindergarten students have been using Code and Go Mice and the classroom kit to build mazes following a blueprint and then program their mice to go through the maze. This activity has presented many opportunities for students to work on their perseverance. communication, and collaboration skills as they have been working in teams of four to complete each design. 3rd -5th grade students would like to thank Pickering Community Club for their generous donation! Our Ozobots have arrived and we will be starting color and block coding with them at the end of January.

While waiting for their robots to arrive, we have completed a virtual tour of Amazon Fulfillment Centers across the United States. Students were able to see coding in the software, hardware such as robots and sensors, and systems including people, hardware, and software in action as they witnessed the fulfillment process from the time customers pressed buy, to the time orders arrived at the delivery site. In addition, students were able to hear three different Amazon engineers explain what it is that they do in their jobs, and how the technology involved affects everyday life.

and experience. In her off time Andee enjoys spending time with her kids and pot belly pig, and takes a line dancing class.





4th grader, David shares, "It was hard to pronounce hard words in the beginning of the year. I started doing reading groups. We would find out vowels (some letters make different sounds and sometimes they say

their name) and sound out letters to get the words right. I know I'm pretty good at reading and I need to get better at reading by sounding out bigger words. I can read more often to be a better reader. My teacher helps me and encourages me and we celebrate when we achieve our things (goals). I like doing the dance for that. My family helps me by telling me to read and reads with me. I'm working hard to achieve my goals. I know what I need to do now and like how many words I will read next month."

Students are actively participating in their learning and it shows! Overall, more students than ever are approaching and meeting benchmark reading goals this school year. Third, fourth, and fifth graders report they enjoy reading as a free time activity and appreciate access to a wide range of books in the school library.

5th grader, Anna says, "School is going well. I love it here! I have lots of friends I can help and they help me too. We can help each other when we have problems. We can always talk things out. When it comes to learning, I'm a better reader now. Reading is really easy for me now. I learned things at school and practiced them at home. My family helps me too. I can see how I am getting better."

Students feel so much pride when they set a goal, create and execute a plan, and then see the results of their hard work. 4th grader Savhanna says it best, "I just keep smiling because I did it!" after working hard to make significant progress on goals she has set for herself.

Preschool has implemented a new curriculum this year-Tools of the Mind. This has helped our students not only improve their executive functioning skills, but also develop early writing skills, math

skills, and more advanced play skills based on Lev Vygotsky's theoretical framework of socio-dramatic play. Tools of the Mind is not only helping our students to learn, but also experience joy and excitement in their learning experiences. Some of the tools we are using to help students to learn include graphics practice (foundational writing for letter formation which embed executive functioning skills), freeze dance (executive functioning skills), and play planning (verbalizing a plan for play time, writing, and drawing to express their thoughts).
