Dear Members of Our Sachem Family,

The budget process began this past fall and included a thorough review of all aspects of the district's current budget, a series of administrative budget meetings, and public review at five regular Board meetings. The Sachem Board of Education, after working closely with the school administration, adopted the 2017-2018 proposed budget of \$314,191,536. On May 16, you will have the opportunity to vote on a proposed 2017-2018 budget that preserves and enhances the quality of our district's educational programs while remaining within the tax levy limit.

This budget maintains the high quality curriculum and instruction that combine a core education with recognition of the ever changing world in which our students will live their lives. It supports students of all abilities and interests. It keeps our athletic, co-curricular, and extra-curricular programs completely intact. It includes expenses for essential capital improvements and for replacements to our aging bus fleet. The proposed 2017-2018 budget also supports the addition of new technology at all schools including computers, robotics kits, 3D printers, and STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art, and Mathematics) kits for each of our elementary schools. These technologies will ultimately be further enhanced through funding from the New York State Smart Schools Investment Plan.

We take great pride in our students' accomplishments and enthusiasm for learning, we are committed to the development of opportunities for all students to demonstrate success in a multitude of ways, and we are grateful to all of our Sachem Central School District stakeholders for their dedication to our schools. 

Provide a statement of assumptions made in projecting a contingency budget for the 2017-18 school year, should the proposed budget be defeated pursuant to Section 2023 of the Education Law. If the Sachem CSD does not have a voter approved 2017-2018 budget, the Board of Education would need to reduce the proposed budget by \$5,936,231. Resulting cuts would include all non-contingent budget items, including all new instructional equipment and hardware, as well as planned capital projects, which include ADA renovations to HS North pool locker room, accessibility compliant field access stairs at HS East, and six replacement school buses. The figures above regarding a 2017-2018 contingency budget are estimates for future consideration. A formal contingency budget would be promulgated for consideration for the Board of Education if the voters compel the District to operate under contingency.

The annual budget vote for fiscal year 2017-18 by the qualified voters of the Sachem Central School District, Suffolk County, New York, will be held at all Elementary schools in said district on Tuesday, May 16, 2017 between the hours of 6:00am and 9:00pm, prevailing time at which time the polls will be opened to vote by voting ballot or machine.

^{1.} The basic school tax relief (STAR) exemption is authorized by section 425 of the Real Property Tax Law.





Q. What does the proposed budget support?

A. The proposed budget maintains the district's academic programs, athletics and co-curricular activities, K-12 music and art offerings, district-wide security while delivering several critical enhancements, including: supplemented funding for Instructional Materials at all Buildings, Regents and AP review sessions, SAT/ACT Prep at the HS Level, enhanced ENL course offerings at the HS level, improvements to the instrumental music curriculum, replacement of outdated desktop PCs and Macs, instructional technology - including STEAM Kits, VEX Robotics Kits, 3D Printers, and more, addition of an Assistant Principal at each secondary building, facilities and equipment upgrades, and enhanced HS elective offerings.

Q: How does the New York State tax cap work?

A. In 2011, New York State enacted a property tax levy limit for school districts, local governments, libraries, and fire and water districts – a stated, but flexible 2 percent increase above the previous year's levy. The rate of inflation and specified exclusions and adjustments can allow for greater or lesser increases. School districts follow an eight-step process that also reflects tax base growth and the previous year's payments in lieu of taxes to calculate their actual tax levy limit. For the 2017-18 school year, Sachem's cap allows an increase of 3.47 percent above last year's tax levy. The district's proposed increase is within the allowable cap, as it has been in the past. Remember that this is the total tax levy increase; individual property owners may see a higher or lower percent of increase based upon each property's changes in assessed value, exemptions and other factors.

Q. In addition to the tax cap, what mandates does the government impose on school districts?

A. All levels of government impose a variety of mandates for which school districts must pay. These include, but are not limited to:

- » Part 154 ELL Mandates
- » BOCES administrative fees
- » Special education mandates
- » Mandated testing and scoring
- » Auditing and financial compliance
- » Academic Intervention Services (AIS)
- » Health insurance premium increases
- » Pension and retirement contributions
- » Implementation of APPR and Common Core Learning Standards, with accompanying staff development and new classroom material costs.

Like most expenses related to government directives, these generally increase rather than decrease annually.



A. If voters defeat the proposed budget, the district has two options: put the same or a revised budget up for a revote, or adopt a contingency budget. If a proposed budget is defeated twice, a contingency budget must be adopted. If that were to occur, state law mandates that the tax levy increase over the current year be capped at zero percent. The Board would need to reduce expenditures by \$5,936,231, which would include items such as all new instructional equipment and hardware, the new secondary assistant principals, facilities equipment, six replacement school buses, as well as various ADA/OCR compliance renovations at HS East and North. In addition to the items listed the Board would also need to eliminate another \$2.6M from the educational program budget.

Q. Will residents be eligible for the property tax rebate as included in the state's budget?

A. Yes. According to the law this year, a homeowner will receive a property tax rebate check from New York State if the school district's budget is within the allowable tax levy cap, the homeowner earns less than \$275,000 and the homeowner is eligible for the STAR exemption. The rebate checks for 2017-18 are based on a percentage of STAR savings and gross income. They are no longer a fixed amount and will vary. For the majority of Sachem homeowners these rebate checks will range from approximately \$121 to \$261, depending on your gross income level. This will significantly offset or in some cases negate any increase in school property taxes.

ELECTION OF SCHOOL BOARD TRUSTEES

The election of three Board Members for a three-year term beginning July 1, 2017. The three year terms of Teri Ahearn, Victor J. Canales and Dorothy Roberts are expiring on June 30, 2017.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

The Sachem Central School District has authorized the use of absentee ballots for the vote on the school district budget and trustee election. Applications for absentee ballots must be received by the District Clerk at least seven days before the election (May 9th) if the ballot is to be mailed to the voter. If the ballot is to be filled out in the District Clerk's office, voters have until the day before the election (May 15th) to pick up the ballot. FURTHER INFORMATION

If you have questions about your current registration status or need further information about voting, call the District Clerk, Allison Florio, at 631-471-1331 during business hours.

A resident of the Sachem Central School District may vote for the election of school board members or upon all matters which may be brought before the annual meeting by the Board of Education.

To qualify for the vote, a person must be:

- » A resident of the Sachem Central School District for at least 30 days prior to the vote.
- » Registered to vote.
- » A citizen of the United States who is at least 18 years old.

The Sachem Central School District has permanent registration records for school district elections and votes. If you registered and/or voted in any school election or referendum or in the general elections since 2012, you do not need to register again to vote on May 16, 2017. To maintain permanent registration, you must have voted and/or registered at least once in the last four years.
