Updated Philosophy

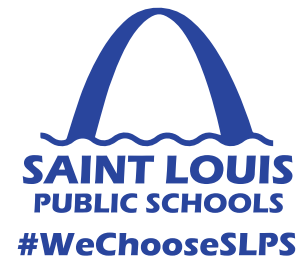


In May 2016 the Code of Conduct Task Force set out to:

- **Increase the use of positive behavior interventions**
- **Provide simple explanations of infractions and responses**
- **Shift from punishment to supporting child development**

State of Missouri Antibullying Policy:

Section 160.775 RSMO

Bullying is aggressive behavior that is intentional, hurtful, and repeated over time, which creates an imbalance of power between the bully and the victim. Bullying affects everyone at the school- the bully, the victim, and the bystanders as it creates a fearful school climate where students do not feel safe. “Bullying” means intimidation, unwanted aggressive behavior, or harassment that is repetitive or is substantially likely to be repeated and cause a reasonable student to fear for his or her physical safety or property; **substantially interferes with the educational performance, opportunities, or benefits of any student without exception; `or substantially disrupts the orderly operation of the school.** Bullying may consist of physical actions, including gestures, or oral cyberbullying, electronic or written communication, and any threat of retaliation for reporting of such acts. Bullying of students is prohibited on school property, any school function, or on a school bus.

Department of Education: Office of Civil Rights Reporting



- New specific data as it relates to students who are bullied

Suspension: Extension and Concerns



- Building leaders respect and understand that the reason the suspension policy is in place is to keep young people in school
- Students with significantly disruptive behaviors need ongoing support

Solutions

- On April 25, 2017 a meeting was held with elementary principals and Local 420 representative to address the challenging behaviors in schools.
- On May 1, 2017 a subcommittee was created in order to develop solutions for a clear process that will strengthen and support schools.
