SRHS 9th Grade English Honors Summer Assignment 2019

• Read and annotate the following book (not the "Adapted for Young Adults" version): Hillenbrand, Laura: Unbroken: A World War II Story of Survival, Resilience, and Redemption.

• Watch the 2014 film adaptation, Unbroken: Angelina Jolie, Director.

Reading Assignment: Laura Hillenbrand's *Unbroken* tells the true life story of Olympic runner Louis Zamperini. He rises above a reputation as a troublemaking youth by discovering how his great talent for running allows him to focus his passions and energy in a positive way. When World War II breaks out, he runs missions as a gunner on a bomber until the day his plane crashes, sending him adrift on a life raft for weeks in the shark-infested waters of the Pacific. Eventually, he is captured and imprisoned in a Japanese POW camp. Upon returning home, he struggles to piece his life back together and is ultimately redeemed by the power of his unbreakable spirit and the support of his loved ones.

Read and annotate the entire book. In your annotations, keep track of your thinking about the passages that will be helpful in completing the writing assignment below.

Writing Assignment Overview: Through the art of editing, filmmakers make difficult decisions about which scenes make it into a movie and which must be left out. These edits can create significant and dramatic changes to a story's arc, a film's meaning, and the audience's engagement. *Unbroken* is no exception--the film is different from the book in many ways. In your essay, you will focus on the overall effect that results from Jolie's process.

Writing Prompt: In a well-organized essay (1,000 words, word processed, double spaced--yes, it can/should be at least a five- paragraph essay), examine the differences in details (major and minor) between the film and the book. What details of Zamperini's life did Jolie decide to leave out of the film? What do you believe are the reasons behind her decisions? In what ways do her decisions affect how the audience ultimately understands Louis Zamperini's character and life?

We recommend first watching the film and then reading the book. This will guide you in your reading annotations. As you read the book after watching the film, it will hopefully become apparent what was left out of the movie. Mark these moments as you make your annotations and write your ideas about how they alter Zamperini's character from the film to the book. Also, note why you feel Jolie might have made the decision to edit out particular details.

Please note, we are absolutely **not** looking for summaries of the book or film. Please be certain that you are addressing the prompt and providing examples from both texts (book and film) to support your ideas. Every paragraph should include evidence from both the film and the book and the evidence should be cited.
