Designated Campus Eating Areas - Enforcement begins this Week!

As we finalize construction here at Terra Linda, we wanted to message an update about **designated eating areas** for the remainder of the 2022-2023 school year and beyond. Once construction is finished we will have access to more benches and eating spaces at the heart of campus.

TL Problem Solving In Action - A Message from our Graduate Profile Coordinator

Graduate Profile Coordinator, Lisa Coyne has been observing our Graduate Profile skills in action in the classroom setting. Last week, she had the pleasure of visiting Lisa Cumming's Graphic Design 1/2 class. The Graphic Design 2 students were working on creating stickers for Ms. Frack to be used on the compost bins here at TL. They had to use their problem solving skills to create stickers that not only inform students, but also change their behavior. They were playing around with sticker



size, font, and images. The stickers had to be both visually appealing and cost effective. They had to think creatively and use a variety of approaches to solve this problem. In addition, the students were working as community advocates. They were taking pride in TL and working on a sticker that would make TL a healthier and stronger community.

In Honors Physiology, Karen Wilhoyte's students have just begun a project where they will design and build a prosthetic limb. It is part of their Support and Motion Unit, where they study the skeletal and muscular systems. Physio students are working on the Science and Engineering Practices (SEP) of the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS). One of the science and engineering practices we are exploring during this project is constructing explanations and designing solutions. This science and engineering practice fits well into the problem solver piece of the graduate profile.

Please continue to share with Lisa any lessons in which the students are practicing Graduate Profile skills. A deep dive into Learners and Community Advocates is up next.

Updates with Tutoring



Tutoring Coordinator Steve Coleman continues to work on new approaches to provide more tutoring to students, especially pushing tutoring support earlier into the school day when more students can access the tutors:

<u>Classroom Peer Tutors</u> -- Peer Tutors have been placed in 13 classes (with 8 teachers), including 3 AVID classes, 3 Special Ed classes, and 1 SDAIE class, supporting approximately 130 students and providing crucial help for the classroom teacher, usually for one to two class periods each week.

<u>Tutorial Drop-In Biology Tutoring</u> -- a new pilot program that will begin this week, in which

Science Biology teachers will send students during Tutorial to

Steve at the Library on a drop in basis, and he will pair them with Peer Tutors who are there and available to tutor Biology. If this model of tutoring works well, it will be expanded to other subjects and Departments, especially Math.

Steve has also been matching students for traditional one-on-one tutoring with Adults and Peers, which occurs at various times in the Library throughout the week, and the <u>Teacher Tutoring Program</u> that Steve organized and oversees occurs regularly before and after school (a new session was just added -- Science on Tuesdays from 2:15-4:15 with Brandon Marweg!).

Topic: The Inner Workings of Teen Social world –what you should know and what you can do

Your teen's social experiences can make or break not just their day, but their high school years and beyond. From changing peer groups, to evolving relationships, to excitement of first love to heartbreak disappointment of break ups... To the inexperienced person the littlest things can have the biggest impact. From being too timid to speak up to being judged to constantly comparing themselves to others, they need our help navigating these experiences to emerge more confident, mature and ready for adult life. Success and failures here matter, but learning and growing from them matters even more.

TLHS MATH DEPARTMENT PROBLEM OF THE MONTH NOVEMBER 2022

Happy November! November is the 11th month, so let's celebrate 11.

I am thinking of 11 integers greater than zero. Let's call them a, b, c, d, e, f, g, h, I, j, and k. Here are some clues:
