As a result of a number of pre-build steps (rolling over, department meetings, matrix meetings, counselor analysis, etc.), we are ending day 1 of the official build at 83%. In other words, 83% of students are flowing into their requested courses. Here is where we are currently. An important reminder that this schedule is subject to change in the upcoming weeks as we clean things on the backend. The document hyperlinked is live and will reflect changes in real time. Chairs will also receive emails if changes need to be made.

CCC Position Open at Terra Linda High

Congratulations to Carol Morales who has accepted a position as the Wellness Coordinator for Bahia Vista Elementary School in SRCS. During her time at Terra Linda, Carol has provided students with a tremendous amount of support as they explore post secondary plans. While we are so sad to lose Carol, we know that Bahia Vista will greatly benefit from her joining their team and utilizing her degree in Social Work.

We are reaching out to staff and our parent community to assist in recruiting a qualified person to replace Carol in the College and Career Center; a position that oversees the work in the College and Career Center and works closely with students, parents, counseling and administration. We are in the process of posting the position for College and Career Advisor for the 2023-24 school year. For more information, see this job description. Regarding compensation, this position is listed as grade 114 on the CSEA Salary Schedule which is between \$51,000 and \$75,000 depending on experience. In addition, this position includes a strong medical and dental benefits plan.

Fully Staffed for 2023-24

Recently we hired a math teacher and we are now fully staffed for 2023-24 as far as classroom teachers. We will share more about our new hires in our welcome back memo over the summer. A tremendous thanks to our teachers who assisted with recruiting new talent, participated in interviews, helped check references, and provided valuable information to new hires. Many teachers have been emailing with our new hires and making them not olyn feel welcome, but already setting up PD opportunities, communicating about curriculum, assisting with classroom set-ups, etc. Thanks for working with us to create a welcoming community and a staff friendly culture for new teachers. All of you make TL a desirable place to work.

Teacher Leadership Team (TLT) Update

The SRCS Teacher Leadership Team (TLT) met on May 11th. Here's the <u>agenda</u> and <u>slide deck</u> from the meeting. At the meeting the TLT made some adjustments to next year's <u>PD scope and sequence</u> (they should be reflected in the document early next week). The TLT is also working on a draft <u>Grading Philosophy</u>. The TLT is going to think of some ways we can get more teacher input on this during the June 13th and 14th PD days. This team is excited to talk about their work with their colleagues and build their leadership skills.

- pupil engagement,
- student supports,
- bullying, and
- substance abuse

Department Budgets 2023-24 (repeat from email)

Every year I distribute a copy of our site budget for staff and departments to review for the next year. Every teacher is given up to \$200 for Office Depot orders. While I recognize at times it is cheaper to buy supplies elsewhere, Office Depot is who we use for general school supplies and we utilize a process involving open purchase orders. Many departments choose to order in bulk as a department to help us manage fewer individual orders. Most departments also choose to prepare their information prior to leaving in the summer so that Kristin can order the materials and they arrive prior to our start date on August 23, 2023.

Recently, our OneTL Parent Boosters approved a \$400 per teacher budget that will be set up for each individual teacher through Amazon. You will receive information from our OneTL Parent Group sent to your school email address by 6/30 and you can begin orders on 7/1. In addition, at our staff meeting next week a parent will be there to share more information about the program or you can refer to this Amazon One Pager here.

The purpose of the <u>Department Budgets 2023-24</u> is to assist teachers in planning ahead with expenditures and to also build an understanding of the many things that are funded to support teaching and learning, from materials and supplies to professional development. There is so much that is not included in this spreadsheet, but it is a snapshot of our site budget. Please take a few minutes to review the document.

In summary, every teacher has \$600 of money for classroom supplies (\$200 through Office Depot & \$400 through Amazon). Teachers should not be making any purchases and expecting reimbursement for items that can be bought utilizing a purchase order. It is essential we follow the purchasing process, and if you are unsure about an expenditure, ASK BEFORE YOU BUY!

Terra Linda Math Department Problem of the Month May 2023



Let your math heart thump! Find you math joy. Be creative and relax with a new polygon.






Image of some initial tiling from Chris Cambre via Geogebra
