Some examples of how TL students think critically are: the Scientific Method, literary analysis, mathematical reasoning, evaluating sources, exploring topics from multiple perspectives, etc. If you have examples of students applying this skill or assessments that assess critical thinking, please let me know or send them my way. I would love to stop by your classrooms and see the great work you are doing.

Also, as TL's Graduate profile Coordinator I came across a great <u>article</u> about the importance of explicitly teaching this skill. If you have time to read it please check it out! A particular quote from the article that stuck out to me was:

75 percent of employers claim the students they hire after 12, 16 or more years of formal education lack the ability to think critically and solve problems -- despite the fact that nearly all educators claim to prioritize helping students develop those very skills.

Hispanic Heritage Month



In recognition of **Hispanic Heritage Month**, our Director of English Learners, Cecilia Perez, has recommended a book that just hit #3 on the New York Times Best Seller list. **Solito**, by Javier Zamora, recounts Javier's journey of crossing the Sonoran desert, being detained by border patrol agents and meeting strangers along the way who protected him. And he does it through the first-person voice of his 9-year-old self.

This story is of particular interest to all of us in San Rafael City Schools because when Javier came to the U.S. from El Salvador, he joined his parents in the Canal neighborhood and began school as a fourth-grader at Bahia Vista. He had the great fortune of being placed in Dee Mackay's class. Dee still teaches at BV and has two sons that attend SRHS. I could share dozens of attributes about Dee as a master teacher and an even more amazing person, but what I will lead with is her kind heart and **ability to connect with students**. Dee does not speak Spanish and yet she was able to welcome Javier into her classroom with care, patience and the resolve to support his integration into a new language, a new school, a new community and a new country. This is a familiar story for many of us who have welcomed and continue to welcome newcomers into our schools and classrooms. Our newcomers come to us with <u>so many strengths</u>, diverse stories and

perspectives that we can all learn from. As educators, our students look to us for guidance and connection. It can feel overwhelming at times to try and meet the needs of all of our students, but I hope that stories like Javier's serve to remind us that with that awesome responsibility comes incredible joy as we see our students grow and thrive.
