I. SOCIAL SCIENCES (A)

World Geography & Cultures

Course covers the concepts and methods of geography by examining humankind's influence on the environment and the environment's impact on humankind. Topics include patterns and processes of world climates, culture, population, urbanization, economic activities, and resources. The class will also offer a geographical perspective on contemporary world problems. Students will investigate economic, demographic, social, political, cultural, and environmental issues, with emphasis on interrelationships, patterns, processes, and potential solutions.

Course offers an in-depth study of selected world civilizations and their history, geography and culture, chosen from the global perspective. Western and non-Western cultures will be compared in the context of philosophies, ethical systems, law, languages, literature, religions, and the arts. Outcome: knowledge of the events that have impacted cultural development and the contributions of various cultures to the modern world.

AP World History (AP)

Equivalent to an introductory college-level class, this challenging course offers a detailed and in-depth study of the evolution of global processes and contacts in different societies. The cultural and historical diversity of civilizations from 8000 BC to the present will be explored through reading and organizing data sources based on themes, writing analytical and document-based essays, and utilizing primary and secondary sources. Students will learn to use evidence to develop arguments and how to identify point of view, context, and bias within historical documents. Designed for accomplished and motivated students, this course requires a signed contract, summer work and taking the AP test in May; a score of 3 or better will qualify for credit at many colleges and universities.

Students will learn to use evidence to develop plausible arguments and how to identify point of view, context, and bias within historical documents. Designed for accomplished and highly-motivated students, this course requires a signed contract, summer work and taking the AP test in May.
