#### 1. OPENING BUSINESS

### 2. PUBLIC HEARING

# 2.1. Sufficiency of Textbooks and Instructional Materials

#### Rationale:

The Board is required to hold an annual public hearing to ascertain through resolution whether each pupil in the District has, or will have prior to the end of the fiscal year, sufficient textbooks and instructional materials that are correlated with standards and frameworks adopted by the State Board of Education. One of the many impacts of the Williams Settlement Legislation is that all state school districts must now approve a resolution that specifically addresses sufficiency of

materials in the four academic core areas, health, and foreign language as well as the availability of science laboratory equipment. Staff has determined that at this time the District is operating with sufficient instructional materials and is ordering additional textbooks and instructional materials as stipulated by this legislation.

#### Rationale:

Carol Doud mentioned that September is National Suicide Prevention Month and she wishes the county would do more to raise awareness.

Trustee Norton mentioned that the student identification cards at Sonora Union High School District have the National Suicide Prevention Hotline phone number on the back side.

#### 4. PRESENTATION

# **4.1.** Introduction of New Staff & Report on Opening of School - Lance Morrow and Roy Morlan

Lance Morrow introduced Sonora High School's new staff members and shared a report on the opening of the school year. The back-to-school rally was well received by the students and back-to-school night was well attended. He shared enrollment by grade level, revealing that enrollment is up, and said that attendance has been strong so far.

Roy Morlan shared his report on the opening of the school year. Cassina High School is at capacity while Theodore Bird High School has room for eight more students. He reported that tomorrow night is open house for parents of Theodore Bird students, and Claim Jumper day is next week. He also shared that, through grant funding, Cassina High School students will learn how to build a tiny house.

# 4.2. Cosmetology Digital Textbook - Kelli Slater

Kelli Slater shared information about the new digital textbook that the board approved in June of 2019. She stated that it has increased the student learning

possibilities exponentially. It brings a digital element to the cosmetology program and teaches the students real world skills.

# 4.3. Career Technical Education (CTE) - Sherryl Godfrey, Lance Morrow and Kelli Slater

Lance Morrow explained that CTE programs prepare students for college and career with real life skills. Many of the courses are A-G registered, articulated with Columbia College and/or offer certification to the students upon successful completion. A Sonora High School student, Jordan Hampton spoke on behalf of the agriculture and FFA programs, and Abby spoke on behalf of the cosmetology program. Sherryl Godfrey gave a financial update that included CTE grant information.

#### 5. REPORTS AND INFORMATION ITEMS

### 5.1. Classified Employee Report

There was no report.

### 5.2. Certificated Employee Report

Debbie Hopper shared that because Sonora High School enrolled more students at the beginning of the school year than anticipated, teachers would like to have more sections opened to alleviate the class sizes. She then gave an update on drama and band, and shared award-winning photos created by photography students. Mrs. Hopper also noted that all teachers have completed their CLAD requirements.

### 5.3. Superintendent Report

#### Rationale:

See attached report, images, and administrative regulation updates (CSBA May 2019 recommendations).

Dr. Miller shared that American flags will be flown at half-mass tomorrow to honor Patriot Day. He also recounted some groups that he has met with and school events that he has attended. He then showed images of students, staff and  $20^{\rm th}$  century classroom equipment. He gave special recognition to Matt Leamy and Mark Alberto for temporarily fixing the scoreboard for a football game to avoid canceling the game.

Trustee Andal suggested seeking out STEM grants to financially support subject related classrooms.

# 5.4. Board of Trustees Report

Student Trustee, Gregory Crook, said that band is preparing for the football game on Friday, and ASB has designated a theme for game days; this Friday will be tiedye. He also noted that Homecoming has been moved to October 18, play auditions are this week, and FFA has begun organizing the Thanksgiving dinner food drive.

Trustee Andal said that he attended a meeting for articulating CTE classes with Columbia College.

Trustee Norton shared that she attended the back-to-school night.

# 5.5. 2019-2020 School Year Rights of Parents, Legal Guardians, & Students Handbooks

#### Rationale:

The handbooks have been distributed.

Sherryl Godfrey shared that and she will be presenting the handbooks to the ninth and tenth grade students tomorrow, and Karen Sells presented them to the eleventh and twelfth grade students today.

### 5.6. State Budget Update - Dana Vaccarezza

Dana Vaccarezza reported that a down trend is expected and that we might be headed toward a recession.

### 5.7. Report on Summer School - Sherryl Godfrey

Sherryl Godfrey reported that summer school began with 102 students enrolled in 153 courses, and 765 total credits were earned. She suggested that the district consider a summer school classroom designated to math next year to better support those students.

# **5.8. Annual Review of Board Policy 6145 Extracurricular and Cocurricular Activities**

#### Rationale:

Pursuant to Education Code section 35160.5, "The governing board of each school district annually shall review the school district policies adopted pursuant to the requirements of this section." No revisions have been recommended by California School Boards Association so the policy remains the same as the previous school year.

### 5.9. 4th Quarter Interest Report and Apportionment - Dana Vaccarezza

Dana Vaccarezza reported that the district earned almost \$50,000 in interest last year.

# 6.2. District Goal No. 4 Career Technical Education and Assessment of Continuing Goal Review at Each Board Meeting

#### Rationale:

District Goal No. 4: Students will have the opportunity to learn workforce skills through high quality career technical and community learning programs aligned to the regional economy.

Trustee Riggs suggests that the district keep looking for grants.

Dr. Miller disclosed that the district is looking at joining with Columbia College for pursuing a grant.

Trustee Riggs suggested that we continue to revisit goals at each meeting.

Trustee Andal likes tying the reports to the goal. For example, tonight's CTE report was linked to the district goal that was discussed.

# 6.3. First Reading of Revised Board Policies, Exhibits and Board Bylaws; CSBAs Updates for July 2019

Dr. Miller shared that Governor Newsom signed a new law so that students can no longer be suspended for defiance/misbehavior alone (EC 4900[k]). He also mentioned that CSBA rewrites policies to match new laws such as the one he just explained.

# 6.4. Suggestions for New Business

#### Rationale:

The District suggests the Governing Board establish the 7-11 Advisory Committee at their meeting on Oct. 8, 2019.

Trustee Andal would like to discuss and clarify the role of the 7-11 Committee at the next board meeting.

Trustee Smith believes the first step would be to determine what needs to be addressed according to education code. Then decide what else needs to be

addressed to solve issues that are relevant in making the Dome more attractive in repurposing it.

Trustee Andal agreed that we need to consider alternative parking. He suggested discussions to clarify the charge of the 7-11 Committee at the next board meeting when the committee is appointed.

Trustee Riggs agreed that it will be tricky to find a creative solution and clarify the primary role to the committee.
