SCHEDULING PROCESS





1 credit

English Elective

Next Gen. Media/Journalism for the 21st Century

Grades 9-12 credit

This course is a semester-long course for students who would like to learn more about the world of Next Gen Media/Journalism. The purpose of the course is to ignite young communicators' interest for advertising, journalism, media research, and public relations while perfecting their creative and critical thinking skills. The course will focus on learning how to communicate effectively in the digital age while becoming published writers using digital tools such as blogging and online journalism, as well as writing and editing print publications for local media outlets. Another focus of the class will involve learning to read and evaluate sources, studying the history of journalism and becoming familiar with the ethics of journalism in order to become young journalists themselves. The course will be founded on publishing pieces for an authentic audience, which will bring it to a deeper level of learning for all students.

1/2 credit



English Elective


Creative Writing

Grades 9-12 1/2 credit

This course provides an opportunity for high school students to pursue creative writing in an English Elective. This course will be student led and driven by the interests of the class, while also facilitated by the teacher to give the foundation of creative writing which usually falls into poetry, short fiction and nonfiction. Peer revision and workshop will be a heavy focus of the class. The purpose of this course is to 1) to engage students in the careful reading and critical analysis of imaginative/creative literature; deepening their understanding of the ways writers use language to provide both meaning and pleasure for their readers and, 2) to enable students to create their own works of literature in various genres, including, but not limited to: short story/fiction, creative nonfiction, drama, and poetry.

Latin Mythology & Roots Electives

New Opportunity!

French 1

Grades 9-12; Proficiency Exam** 1 Credit

Reflect the philosophy and goals found in both the ACTFL World-Readiness Standards for World Languages and the New York Learning Standards for World Languages. The overall objectives of the French 1 course are to develop, reinforce, and refine proficiency in the three modes of communication (interpersonal, interpretive, and presentational). Through an essentially inductive approach, students will gain an understanding of how the language is structured and how they can use this knowledge to express their own needs and talk about the world around them. By developing and refining their skills of observation, students also acquire a basic understanding and appreciation of the diversity of cultures in the French - speaking world. This course is designed to meet the needs of students who are interested in beginning their study of the French language.





New Opportunity!

Italian 1

Grades 9-12 1 Credit

In Italian 1 students continue developing skills in the interpretive,

interpersonal, and presentational modes. Students are encouraged to use the language in a new context with each new unit. The goal is to move students from Novice to Intermediate proficiency level. Students create with language by combining language they have memorized previously. Learners expand their skills through a cross-cultural lens, in the context of topics that are meaningful and relevant to the students' lives and society.







World Language Additional Electives

Mythology & Latin Roots 1 1/2 credit

- Survey of ancient Greek and Roman stories about heroes, gods and the universe and it illustrates the influence of these myths on the art, literature, language and culture of the modern world.
- Students will improve their critical-thinking skills by understanding, and appreciating classical languages, relating literature to its historical or social background; recognizing current relevance of ancient literature; and applying acquired knowledge to other subjects.

Note: This course meets for a single period on an alternating day basis (A/B)

Mythology & Latin Roots 2

½ credit

This course is the study of additional ancient Greek and Roman stories about heroes, gods and the universe and it showcases the connections with modern world literatures and media. Students will learn basic Latin vocabulary, history and culture and expand their English and academic vocabulary with a deeper study of Latin and Greek roots sampling SAT and ACT prep exercises. Note: *This course meets for a single period on an alternating day basis (A/B). Completion of part 1 & 2 will equate to fulfillment of Latin 1.*

Shinnecock Culture & Language

This course celebrates the language, culture and local history of the Shinnecock Nation. Language is an expression of how people live, think and feel. Exploring our local history and the language of indigenous people is a way to understand the past. Together we will engage in activities that highlight our local Native American culture and celebrate its beauty and relevance in modern day. This class would be an elective credit towards graduation.

Additional Music Electives

Music Theory 1

Grades 9-12

1/2 credit

Students will define and identify basic elements of music and how they are integrated in other fields of knowledge. Identification of pitch, clef, and rhythmic notation as well as construction of scales, intervals, meters and keys. Students will learn chords and chord progressions, write simple melodies, and study various forms of short works. This course is offered in the Fall semester, with the expectation that the student will continue on in Music Theory 2 during the spring semester. (This course may be taken for college credit through Suffolk County Community College Beacon program at a reduced cost).

Music Theory 2

Grades 9-12

1/2 credit

This course provides the fundamental building blocks necessary to study music at the collegiate level. Topics covered include music notation (pitch, harmony, rhythm, intervals, chords), aural skills (melodic, harmonic, rhythmic dictation, solfege) and keyboard skills (melodies in both hands, chord progressions). Prerequisite: Music Theory I or teacher recommendation. (This course may be taken for college credit through Suffolk County Community College's Beacon program at a reduced cost)




