SOUTH COLONIE 5454-R

STUDENT AUTOMOBILE USE REGULATION

The following rules apply to the operation of any motor vehicle within the confines of any real property owned by the District:

- 1. Operation of permitted motor vehicles will be allowed only upon improved roads, driveways, and parking areas.
- 2. The maximum speed permitted shall be fifteen (15) miles per hour.
- 3. Parking or standing of all motor vehicles is permitted only in designated parking areas. When individual parking spaces are indicated by signs, barriers, or pavement markings, vehicles must be placed and left in position to conform with such signs, barriers, or pavement markings.
- 4. Where entrance or exit signs have been posted or placed at access points to and from public highways, the direction of traffic must conform thereto. A full stop is required before entering upon any public highway.
- 5. Where signs have been posted regulating the direction of traffic, they must be complied with.
- 6. The operation of any motor vehicle on driveways or parking areas in such manner as to cause it to slide, slip, swerve, skid, or veer from side to side is expressly forbidden at all times, as is the repeated circling, backing, or starting of such vehicles anywhere on District property.
- 7. A violation of any of the above rules constitutes a traffic infraction and may subject the person convicted thereof to a punishment by fine, imprisonment, or both.
- 8. Any police officer or peace officer shall have the right and authority to enforce the foregoing rules and any and all persons charged with the violation thereof shall be dealt with in accordance with the provisions of the Criminal Procedure of the State of New York.
