Summary

They learn about the characteristics of tall tales, such as exaggeration and larger-than-life characters, and compare and contrast this genre with fairy tales.

Summary

They will learn about the first Olympic Games held in honor of Zeus, the significance of the battles of Marathon and Thermopylae, and the conquests of Alexander the Great. Students will also learn to establish a character and will incorporate facts about ancient Greece into a piece of fictional writing.

Students will learn about Great Britain's three-part plan to win back the United States, including attacks on Washington, D.C. and Baltimore, and the attack on New Orleans in an attempt to gain control of the Mississippi River.
