Road conditions as well as temperatures and in particular, wind chill temps ultimately factor into any decision made to postpone or cancel school and school activities. Ultimately, as a parent, the decision is yours to determine if conditions are such that you feel it is unsafe for students to attend school. School officials collaborate with law enforcement, our bussing company as well as neighboring districts to make a decision that is most appropriate for us. ### Semester Exams

Just like last year, our first semester exam period will take place on Friday, December 16th at 2:10pm. This initial exam period will follow a shortened 7-period day of all classes meeting for the final time for the semester on the 16th. Semester exams will resume on Monday, December 19th at 9:00am (Period 1), 10:30am (Period 3) and 1:00pm (Period 5) and continue on Tuesday, December 20th at 9:00am (Period 2), 10:30am (Period 4) and 1:00pm (Period 6). Students can get access to their teachers from 8:00am-9:00am and 2:30pm-3:30pm on the 19th and 20th. The first semester ends at 3:30pm, December 20th.

#### Some reminders regarding testing days that we share with the students include:

- Lunch is OPEN. You may stay here or go, as necessary.
- You are required to remain in your classroom for the entire test period.
- You may bring with you:
  - o Extra study materials
  - o A book to read
- Trips to the locker, library or commons will not be allowed during testing periods.
- Students spending open periods in the building should be in the commons or library working quietly. No students should be gathering or wandering halls during test periods.
- Freshmen are REQUIRED to attend study halls, as scheduled.

## Safe2Say: An App for Students to Report Concerns

Vermillion High School recently held an assembly for students regarding a new anonymous reporting platform called "SAFE2SAY," which is being implemented throughout South Dakota. During the assembly, the Director of the South Dakota School Safety Center, Brett Garland, talked about the platform with the entire student body.

The idea behind the system is to encourage students to report things that they would otherwise feel uncomfortable reporting directly. Things like bullying, school violence, domestic abuse, or suicidal ideations are some of the things that have already been reported across the state.

Reports can be made in one of three ways. Students can download the SAFE2SAY app, use the SAFE2SAY website, or call 1-844-373-7233. A trained analyst with the state monitors

incoming reports via all three avenues and will ask any clarifying questions to the person making the report if more information is needed.

Once this information is collected, they will forward the report to the specific location of the concern. If the matter reported does not involve an immediate safety concern, the information is shared with the school administration where the student attends for further investigation. If the matter involves an immediate or potential safety concern, the information is shared with the local communication center, which will send the appropriate resources to follow up on the concern at the time the report is received.

The platform is not designed to replace reporting concerns directly to teachers, school administration, or the school resource officer (SRO). We still encourage and prefer that students report any concerns directly to a trusted adult. During my time as an SRO, students have shared various concerns with me, which we want to see continue as it is the best way to address concerns quickly. SAFE2SAY is simply another avenue for students to use if they are uncomfortable directly reporting a concern, so the matter is still investigated, and the proper assistance provided.

### Need a Tutor? How about a FREE Tutor?

The <u>Dakota Dreams Online Tutoring Program</u> provides free online tutoring to K–12 students in South Dakota in the subjects of English/Language Arts, Math, Science, and Social Studies. Parents can register students for virtual one-on-one tutoring sessions using a simple and secure online platform.





Once registered, sessions can either be pre-scheduled or accessed on-demand. All sessions are taught by university students already accepted into the School of Education at Northern State University or Black Hills State University.

### **Dual Credit Courses**

Spring Dual Credit registration opens November 1st-December 20th (see Mr. Hayes).

Stay current with your course work and communicate with your instructor if you have questions or fall behind. Reach out to dual credit advisors with any concerns or questions if you are in need of help.

## Scholarships

Scholarships are now available. Make sure to have your student stop into Student Services or check his/her/their email for more information.

## Dual Credit Speech and Pre-Calculus/Calculus

If your student is interested in taking care of that freshman speech requirement at the college or university level while still in high school, look to have them enroll in CMST 101 offered through USD, taught by USD faculty, here at VHS in the spring semester.

Additionally, Pre-Calculus and Calculus will also be offered for credit to be signed up for in the spring semester. These math courses will be taught by Mr. Settles. Have your student see his/her/their counselor for more details.

The 2023-2024 Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) will be available October 1, 2022. FAFSA can provide your student with grants, loans, and work study funds from the Federal Government. It is best to get it done early since some of the funds are available on a first come first served basis. What are the deadlines for filling out the FAFSA form?

To be considered for federal student aid for the 2023-24 award year, you can complete a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) form between Oct. 1, 2022, and 11:59 p.m. Central time (CT) on June 30, 2023.

Any FAFSA form corrections or updates must be submitted by 11:59 p.m. CT on Sept. 10, 2023. However, many states and colleges have earlier deadlines for applying for state and institutional financial aid, use Find your state's deadline. Check with your college or career school about its deadlines. Because of the variation in state and college deadlines, it's highly recommended that you fill out the FAFSA form as soon as you can after Oct. 1 to ensure that you don't miss out on available aid.<sup>1</sup>
