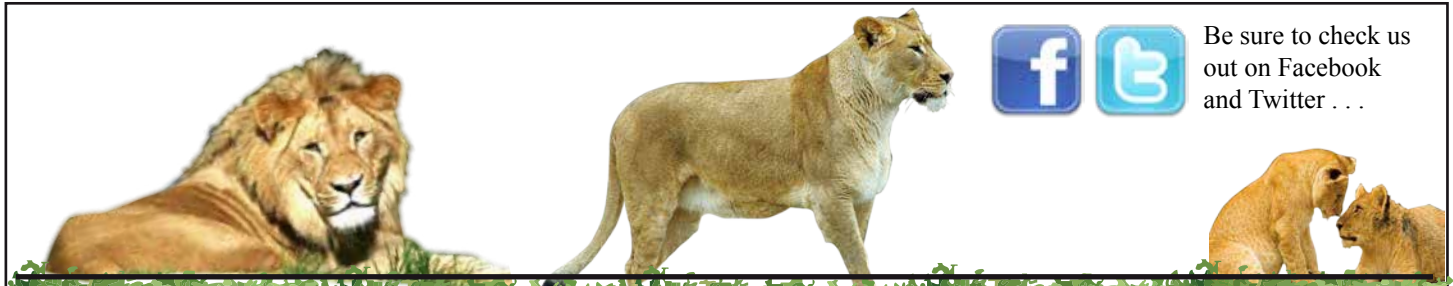

Students To Watch Experiment Sent Into Space

MR. MUNSON’S COLLEGE BIOLOGY CLASS will be traveling to Cape Canaveral, Florida on Thursday, June 7, to watch their experiment blast into space. Seniors David Graham, Shannon Nye, Brandon Bailey, Trinity Roulo, Tyler Watson, and Nichelle Dannheim participated in the Student Spaceflight Experiment Program, which concluded with their experiment being chosen and sent into space. The students designed an experiment to test regenerative effects in space. Their experiment title is: **The Effects of Ascorbic Acid on Planaria Regeneration in Microgravity.** In addition to watching the rocket launch with their experiment, they will get to tour the Kennedy Space Station.

First-Year Robotoics Team Places 32nd in State

Seven of Secondary students, accompanied by coaches Mr. Tyler Carman and Mrs. Caitlin Bowen, participated in the FIRST Robotics Competition at the Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) March 14-17 at the FIRST Finger Lakes Regional. The Big Cat Robotics 6892 competed against 50 other teams worldwide. They placed 32nd out of 50 teams and second out of six rookie (first-year) teams.

According to Mrs. Bowen, Wellsville Secondary School STEAM Instructional Coach and FIRST Big Cat Robotics 6892 Advisor, “The students were given a six-week build period to design, order parts, build, and test their robot. Along with the robot, the team completed a business plan to submit for additional awards. As a rookie (first-year) team, the students did amazing ranking 32nd place. The team is already planning for next year’s build season, which starts in January, and for a community event to be held in May. Congratulations, Big Cat Robotics!”

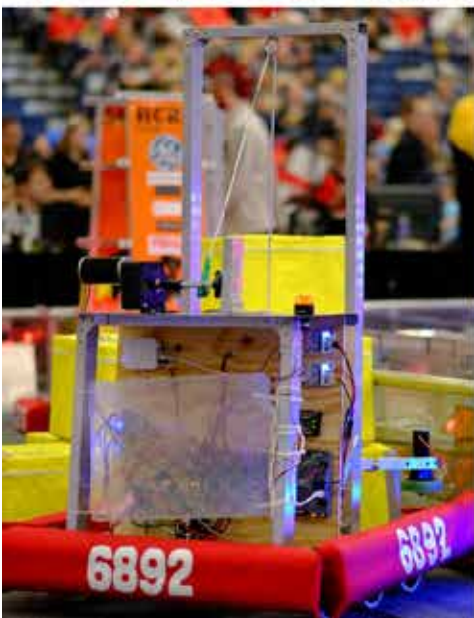

Summer Food Service Program

The Wellsville CSD announces its participation in the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP). Meals will be provided to all children 18 years and under without charge. In accordance with Federal civil rights law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, the USDA, its Agencies, offices, and employees, and institutions participating in or administering USDA programs are prohibited from discriminating based on race, color, national origin, sex, disability, age, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA.

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Seniors Visit Job Corps, Explore Options

As they approach graduation, Wellsville Secondary seniors continue to explore career options. In May, approximately 20 seniors visited the Job Corps center in Cassadaga.

Job Corps is a national program which has been operated by the U.S. Department of Labor since 1964. It provides academic and technical training to people ages 16-24. The center in Cassadaga trains students for careers in carpentry, electrical, painting, and security. Students can also become certified nurses aides and licensed practical nurses.



Unlike college, a Job Corps campus operates with strict rules and curfews. Also, unlike college, everything is free. Students receive training, room and board, and uniforms. They also earn a small stipend.

Wellsville students toured the campus and met with instructors and students. Wellsville Teacher Samantha Granger arranged the visit to provide a post-high school option to students who want to further their education without the expense of college.

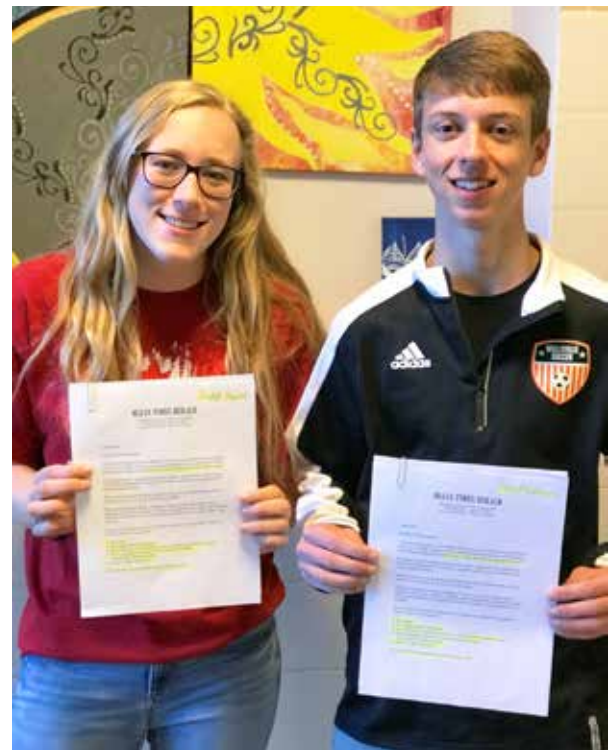
BOCES Summer School Program

Students in grades 9-12 who fail a course or examination and do not retake it in Summer School may face spending more than four years to complete a high school diploma. Graduation requirements call for additional courses to earn 22 ½ credits. This makes it difficult to make up classes the following year if any courses must be repeated. This is especially true for students who are working toward a vocational/technical high school diploma. Modeling Their School Pride

Revisions to School Health Services Regulations Effective 7/1/18

Effective 7/1/2018, the mandated years for health exams and screening will change. In addition, only the approved NYS School Health Examination Form may be used to document health exams to provide consistency across the state.

The Changes Are Provided Below:

- Health Examinations will be required in grades PreK or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9, and 11.
- Vision screening for distance and near vision acuity will be required within 6 months of admission to school and in grades PreK or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.



- Hearing screening utilizing pure tone testing will be required within 6 months of admission to school and in grades PreK or K, 1, 3, 5, 7, and 11.
- Scoliosis screening will be required in grades 5 and 7 for girls and grade 9 for boys.

What You Need To Know:

The use of the approved health form and changes to the grade level requirements are not effective until 7/1/18.

- Schools should use the current form and follow the current guidance for the remainder of this school year.
- 2018-19 is a transition year and any health exam form signed by a NYS Physician, Nurse Practitioner, or Physician Assistant may be accepted.
- Changes for screening grades are not effective until 7/1/18 and will not be implemented until the 2018-19 school year.
- **SCHOOLS SHOULD NOTIFY PARENTS/GUARDIANS WHOSE STUDENTS WILL BE IN GRADES PreK OR K, 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 AND 11 IN THE 2018-2019 SCHOOL YEAR**



NOW OF THE NEED TO OBTAIN A HEALTH EXAMINATION FOR NEXT SCHOOL YEAR.

- For the 2019-2020 school year, ONLY the approved NYSED form will be accepted.

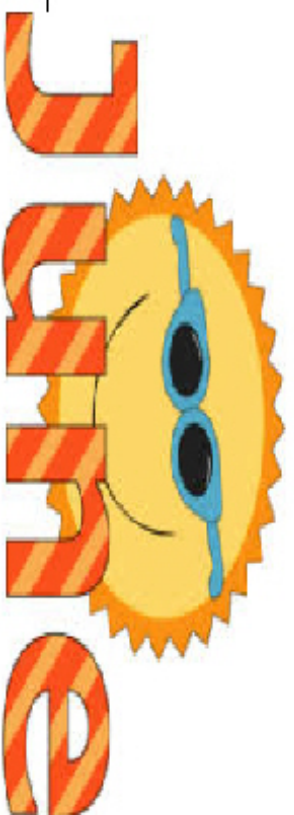

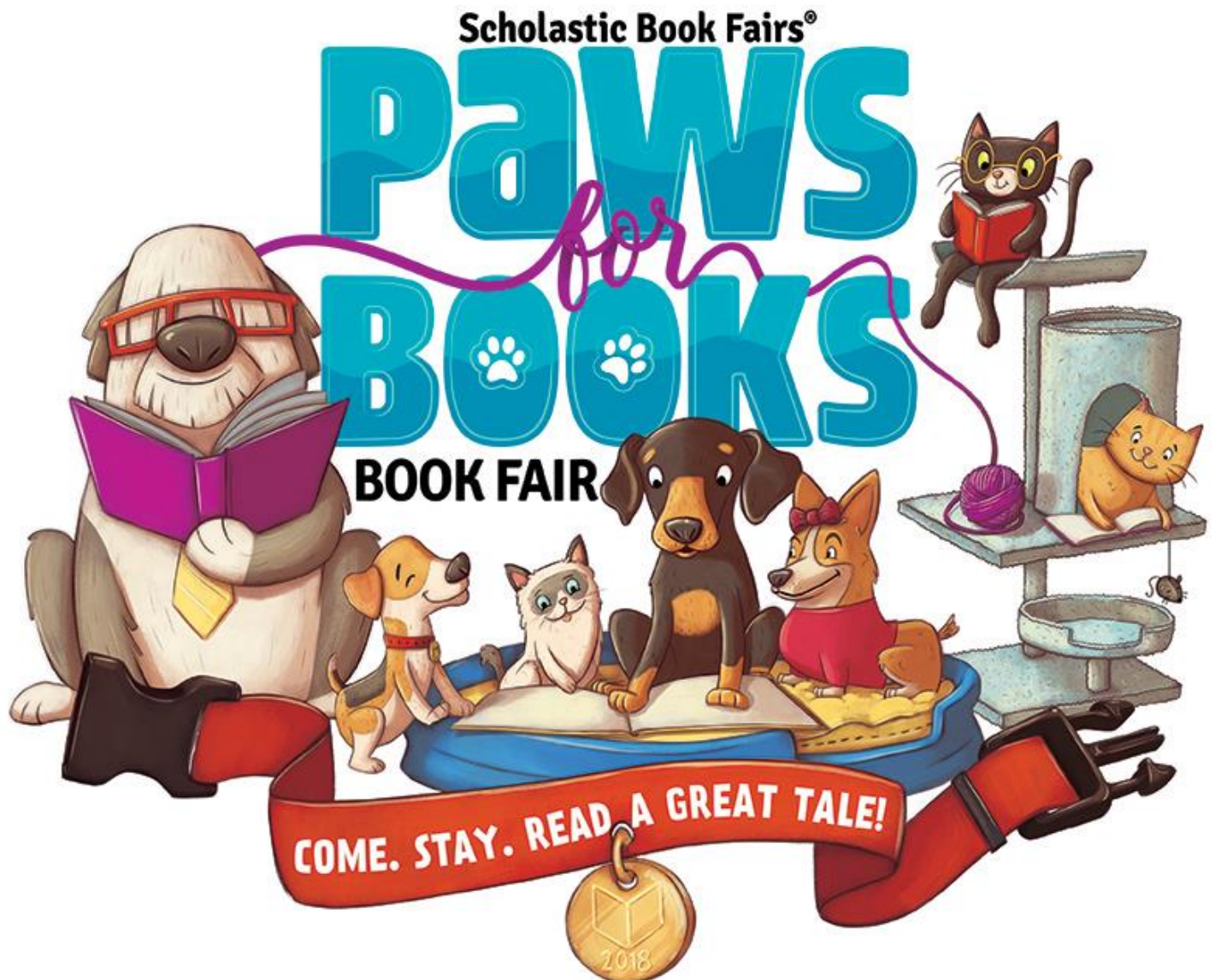
