


"I think it's a little sad the sports season has come to an end because I enjoyed watching the games. I feel pretty comfortable in my senior year. It's been a good last one."

SWEET TREAT



Halloween Hot Cocoa Bombs

- 12 OUNCES HIGH-OUALITY BITTERSWEET CHOCOLATE, FINELY CHOPPED
- TWO 1.38-OUNCE PACKAGES HOT COCOA MIX (WITHOUT MARSHMALLOWS)
- 18 TO 24 PUMPKIN SPICE MARSHMALLOWS, SUCH AS JET-PUFFED
- 6 SMALL CANDY GHOSTS
- 6 SMALL CANDY SPIDERS
- 1 TO 2 TABLESPOONS CHOCOLATE SPRINKLES
- 6 REGULAR MARSHMALLOWS
- 12 CANDY EYES OR 6 ADDITIONAL CANDY SPIDERS, FOR DECORATION, IF DESIRED
- MILK, FOR SERVING

Temper 8 oz. of the chocolate at about 100 degrees F. Divide the chocolate into silicone bomb molds, only covering the sides of the mold. Let sit at room temperature for about 20 to 30 minutes. Gently remove the chocolate half-spheres from the molds.

Divide the hot cocoa among the half-spheres, then add 3 or 4 pumpkin marshmallows, 1 ghost, 1 spider and 1/2 to 1 teaspoon sprinkles. To seal the bombs, set an unfilled half-sphere on the skillet open-side down for just a second to warm the chocolate. Then press two halves together.

To make the marshmallow webs: Put the regular marshmallows in a small microwave-safe bowl and microwave about 10 to 15 seconds. With gloved hands, pull up a little bit of marshmallow and stretch between your fingers to make thin webbing. Stretch the webbing over and around the bombs.

During fall, winter is on it's way, and with the cold weather approaching, layers are a fun way to spice up your wardrobe!




Following the fall theme, we see more sweaters coming into fashion, and muted colors are in style.
