Teacher Feature



Mr. Jim Kralovec is the Stambaugh Elementary School physical education teacher for grades kindergarten through 5th. Mr. K. is currently in his 3lst year of teaching. He has taught all 3l years here at West Iron County. Below is an inside scoop from Mr. K.



What made you want to be a teacher?

"It's just something that I always knew I wanted to do. My dad was a teacher and my mother was a coach, so I guess it was kind of ingrained in me. I wanted to be a coach also and at the time, most all coaches were teachers."

What are some difficulties?

"For me, it is seeing students not do their best. It is also when students do not follow directions because they are not paying attention or have chosen to have a bad attitude. It is very challenging sometimes telling students what they do not want to hear but need to hear. That is part of our job. You want your words and emotions to come across in a way that will connect with the student. That's why we are here. Sometimes students don't get it, that we are trying to help them because we really care. When we really think about it, it's ok to make mistakes. It's ok to mess up. That's how we learn. Luckily for me, I don't see much of this. Overall, the students have been outstanding! They try very hard and they follow directions. This has made my job really, really fun."

What will you miss most when you retire?

"Well, I don't know when I will retire. I would have to say it will be having fun with the kids and their enthusiasm. I love to see kids giving their best effort and being excited."

Do you have any regrets?

"Lots of them! But they stem from me making mistakes. I do not regret one bit becoming a teacher, and I would do it all over again if I was in college again. I feel like I have been improving every year. Teaching is like all jobs; there are some things that are not fun and are difficult. But overall, I really enjoy teaching."

Are you still doing the Mileage Club?

"We have been every spring, and I think we will probably do it again this year. We just started keeping records a few years ago. I really wish we would have kept records when we started Mileage Club years ago because some of the students who are in high school now did really, really well!"

Throughout elementary school, springtime brought tons of joy to the students. One prime reason is Mileage Club. Students are given a yellow, foot-shaped paper with circles to be filled in. These circles get filled in each time a student runs/walks a lap. Once all circles are filled in, they get holes punched with the same process. - Two letters of recommendation are needed (ask teachers, private instructors, etc.)
- A written essay explaining the prompt "Why should I be the recipient of a [insert relevant scholarship category title]?"
- High school transcripts are needed. These can be found on your Parchment account.
- Be sure that you are completely eligible for each scholarship you apply to. Do not apply to all of them in mass, as they most likely will not be accepted this way.

Strawberry Banana Smoothie Bowl


INGREDIENTS
