


Supplies

Attendance is Important!


Daily school attendance is essential to the educational success of each student. Research has shown that 10% or more of instructional time missed by students (pre-k to grade 12) is an early warning indicator for possible academic struggles; this measure is used to define chronic absenteeism nationwide.

If your child is absent -

We will be sure to document missed classwork and assignments and collect the necessary papers. Your child will receive an "absent folder" when they return, or you can pick up the assignments at the front office. Please give 24-hour notice so we have time to get the materials together.




ELA Curriculum



- New reading curriculum Benchmark Advance. I am very excited about it!!! There are a lot
 of materials and a wide variety of resources (leveled readers, online books, centers). I think

ELA/Reading Goals



A year of transitions & new skills: 3rd graders transition from "learning to read" to "reading to learn." They move from predominantly concrete thinking to more abstract thinking. They become more independent and gain more responsibility.

Priorities: Do we take standardized tests seriously? Yes...but a love of learning and reading is my main priority! My main goals are to build your child's self-esteem and make sure he/she maintains a love for learning and a life-long love of reading!

Always have a next book ready!!! Classroom library, SJE library, Public library, audible books, digital books (MyOn, Epic), reading notebooks

The Importance of Reading

READ 20 Minutes A Day!

If they start reading for 20 minutes per night in Kindergarten, by the end of 6th grade, Student A will have read for the equivalent of 60 school days, Student B will have read for 12 school days, and Student C will have read for 3 school days.



Homework & Reading

Students are required to read a book at their level for at least 20 minutes each night. Practice, practice. You can't improve and grow at something if you don't practice.

NO reading logs for two reasons:

- 1) There isn't a huge positive vibe from completing reading logs, by either students or parents.
- 2) It sends the message that reading is a school activity, rather than something that is to be enjoyed something that takes you places in life.

I do, however, encourage students to jot down any thoughts they may have as they read so they can share them with me during our weekly 1:1 meeting.

I also encourage you to read aloud with your child on occasion to practice fluency (reading clearly and with emotion). Students will be encouraged to create a "Favorite Reading Spot" at home. Look for details to come home in the next few weeks!
