
This year we have implemented a new positive behavior incentive school wide. On the first day of school we had students draw a slip of paper that was either red, white, or blue. They were then assigned to that team. As new students arrive they will also choose a slip of paper to be assigned to a team. This means students Pre-K-5 make up each team. Every Friday we show our school spirit by dressing in our team color.

- Students caught doing something good (behavior or a cademic) can receive a point from any staff member at Liberty.
- These points are tracked weekly in each classroom, and then compiled in the cafeteria every Friday.
- Students are able to track how their team is doing. At the end of each month, the team with the highest number of points will win a reward.

What is SOAR? Has your child talked about going to SOAR? At Liberty Elementary we are extremely fortunate to have the additional resource of SOAR: Student Outcome Achieve Results. Students are selected based upon data and receive an additional amount of time for math and/or reading skills. We have three amazing paraprofessionals that work extensively in small group on guided reading and/or math These groups are reskills. evaluated at midterms and at the end of each grading period.



Here at Liberty we take bullying very seriously. Deputy Josh Muse and Mrs. Whaley ensure that all Liberty students have an accurate understanding of what bullying is and what the students should do if they see someone bullying another student. Talking Time

Another busy year beginning in the Speech Room. Students from Pre-K through Fifth grade participate in structured activities to practice correct sound production, turn taking, answering thought questions with grammatically correct, complete sentences, controlling stuttering, using higher level thinking skills, and most of all, listening. Children work with small groups of peers. Kindness and support for one another is encouraged.

Mrs. Joan Brown is the Speech/Language Pathologist. She tests, writes goals and IEPs, plans activities and intervention strategies. She has been at Liberty for over 20 years.

Mrs. Cheryle Jayne is the Speech Tech. She prepares materials, creates and follows up on meeting invitations, gives basic tests, and keeps the Speech Room running smoothly. She has been at Liberty for over 10 years.

Both Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Jayne work directly with children. It is not unusual to hear the Speech Room described as noisy. It is full of talking, commenting, repeating, poetry and rhymes, singing, and, of course, lots of laugher.


