## The Hisory of Empty Rowls

In 1990, a high school art teacher in Michigan helped his students solve a problem. They were searching for a way to raise funds to support a food drive. What evolved was a class project to make ceramic bowls for a fund raising meal. Guests were served a simple meal of soup and bread. They were invited to keep the bowl as a reminder of world hunger.

By the following year, the idea had evolved into *Empty Bowls*, a project to provide support for food banks, soup kitchens, and other hunger fighting organizations. The Imagine/Render Group was created to promote *Empty Bowls*. Since then, *Empty Bowls* events have been held throughout the world, and millions have been raised to fight hunger.

In Charlotte County, Joann Winkler began the *Empty Bowls* program in 2000 with just 40 bowls. They had to beg people to come. Since that time, the *Empty Bowls* event has moved to several locations as we outgrew the facilities. This year, the event will be held on Thursday, November 8th, from 4:30pm to 7pm at New Day Christian Church, 20212 Peachland Blvd., Port

Charlotte. Tickets are \$12.00. Local musicians/entertainers donate their time. This year This year we will be entertained by Kingsway Chorus, Elementary Neil Armstrong Chorus and Liberty Elementary Chorus. You will have a choice of three bowls of soup from approximately 30 different varieties. Bottled water and are also provided. bread You will be able to select a handmade bowl made by community members, public school students, and local artists (artist bowls are usually selected for an additional cost). There will be a silent auction and a live auction.

#### Talking Time

Otitis Media is inflammation of the middle ear (behind the eardrum). It is one of the most common illnesses of childhood. Usually there is air in the middle ear space but with otitis media there is fluid behind the eardrum. The fluid may be infected or not. Some of the symptoms are:

Child pulls at ear Child says ear hurts Drainage from ear Fever Irritability Poor sleep

A child may have all, some, or none of these symptoms. There are three ways to treat otitis media: 1) waiting and watching, 2) antibiotics, 3) surgery to put tubes in the child's ear

A health care provider is the best source to determine the best treatment.

In the Speech room, we are concerned about otitis media because if a child has trouble hearing, he cannot learn to produce speech sounds correctly.

# RED RIBBON WEEK

**Red Ribbon Week** is celebrated annually October 23 through 31st, is the nation's oldest and largest **drug** prevention awareness program.

Red Ribbon Week was started after the death of Drug Enforcement Administration DEA) Special Agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena, who in 1985 was brutally tortured and murdered by drug traffickers he was investigating in Mexico. As a tribute to SA Camarena, high school friend, Henry Lozano and Congressman Duncan Hunter, created "Camarena Clubs" and the wearing of a red ribbon to show their oppositions to drugs.

In 1988, the National Family Partnership (NFP) coordinated the



first National Red Ribbon Week with President and Mrs. Reagan serving as Honorary Chairpersons. Since then, the Red Ribbon campaign has taken on national significance, and NFP continues to coordinate the campaign for families, schools and communities across the nation each year. Wearing red ribbons during the



month of October continues to represent our pledge to live drug free and honors the sacrifice of all who have lost their lives in the fight against drugs.

During the week students saw many areas of law enforcement and the tools they use to help fight the war on drugs. Children learned how and when to call 911 to report a crime or if they need assistance from Law Enforcement. Children had the opportunity to see many different types of police vehicles from patrol cars and motorcycles to

undercover vehicles. K9 units also provided demonstrations and explained how using our four legged officers can help our continuing mission to eliminate drugs in our neighborhoods.



# Book Reports





All of our online programs can be accessed through our county CLASSLINK portal. Once students are logged into their Classlink account, all of their websites will be available as icons.

iReady is a computer based program that provides both assessment and practice for math and reading. The goal for all students is to make one year's growth in both areas and score in the proficient range for their grade level.

After the assessment, students are placed in an individualized instructional path for each of these areas. These practice lessons align to our classroom materials and enhance the student learning experience. We encourage each student to "STRIVE for 45" by completing 45 minutes in their reading path and 45 minutes in their math path per week. We ask that your student completes lessons at home to reach this goal. Continue to check your child's progress on their log in screen and encourage them to pass all lessons with a 75% or better. iReady can be accessed through Classlink.



Accelerated Reader is a program that allows students to earn points for reading and comprehending books. In order to earn points, a student needs to read a book and understand what the book was about. Then log

on to AR using the account provided by their teacher, to take a quiz on the book. Most picture books have 5 questions, and most chapter books have 10 questions. If the student receives a 100% they will earn full points for the book, however if they receive less than a 100% they will receive a portion of the points. Most picture books are worth 0.5 points and chapter books vary in point value based on difficulty. **Quizzes can only be taken at school during school hours**, but we encourage students to read their AR books at home. Kindergarten students will begin taking AR quizzes when they master 100 sight words. You can find out if a book has an AR quiz by visiting www.arbookfind.com.

#### So how can students celebrate these points?

Each grade level has a point goal to reach by the end of the school year. If they reach that goal, they will earn an AR t-shirt and an ice cream party. As students earn points, they will have opportunities throughout the year to purchase items at the AR store using their points.



**Reflex** helps students of all levels to develop fluency with their basic facts in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Math fact fluency is the quick and effortless (automatic) recall of basic math facts. This makes learning new math skills much more attainable for students.







Students can earn a **Movie and Popcorn party** twice a year if they achieve and maintain 100% fact fluency on Reflex. Students login and practice math facts through colorful interactive video games. Once they have answered enough facts correctly for the day, they will earn a green light. This should be **done at least 3 days per week**.
