

Three Vacancies on School Board

The Wellsville Central School Board of Education announces three school board vacancies expiring on June 30, 2014. These vacancies are three-year terms and will expire June 30, 2017. Anyone interested in running for the school board can pick up a petition at the District Office, located in the MS/HS Complex at 126 West State Street in Wellsville. The petition requires signatures of twenty-five (25) qualified voters of the district, and must be filed with the District Clerk at least thirty (30) days prior to the budget vote on May 20, 2014. The last day petitions can be accepted is April 21, 2014. Please direct any questions you may have to Dawn Youmans, District Clerk at 596-2170.

To qualify for membership on the school board, a candidate:

- Must be able to read and write.
- Must be a qualified voter of the

district; that is, a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age or older, and not adjudged to be an incompetent.

- Must be and have been a resident (but need not be a taxpayer) of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one year immediately before election.
 - May not have been removed from

any school district office within the preceding year.

- May not reside with another member of the same school board as a member of the same family.
- May not be a current employee of the school board.
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office.



U of R Announces Awards at WHS

Since 1933, the University of Rochester has maintained a tradition of helping high schools recognize their most talented students. The University of Rochester currently offers awards to recognize outstanding juniors in high school.

To be considered for these scholarships, students must first apply for admission to the University. Upon application for admission, winners are automatically considered for the respective scholarship. The scholarship provides each qualified student \$7,500 to \$20,000 per year for four years. Selection for these scholarships is competitive and is based upon the overall strength of the student's application for admission.

The University of Rochester is proud to continue the tradition of the Bausch and Lomb Honorary Science Award, awarded each year to high school juniors who demonstrate exceptional promise in the sciences. Wellsville High School's nominee to receive the Bausch & Lomb Honorary Science Award is Jordan Pearson.

Scott Miles has been nominated by WHS to receive the University of Rochester's Humanities/Social Sciences Award. This award is named in honor of famous Rochester natives Frederick Douglass and Susan B. Anthony. The University is proud to continue the tradition of these pioneers through extensive research and study devoted to social justice and human rights.

Wellsville High School's third nominee is **Sarah Murphy**. Sarah has been nominated for the George Eastman Young Leaders Award. Selection for this award is based upon strong leadership experience at school and in the community and extensive involvement in extracurricular activities.

Wellsville High School's fourth and final nominee is **Liam Cunningham**. Liam is our nominee for the University of Rochester's Xerox Award for Innovation and Information Technology. The junior nominated for this award should demonstrate achievement in the pursuit of innovative approaches.

Each year, more than 3,000 high schools around the world participate in this award recognition program. Congratulations to our nominees!

Two Receive Elmira College Key Awards

WHS is proud to announce the recipients of the Elmira College Key Award, from the Class of 2015, are **Dakota Chaffee** and **Alyssa Smith** (*above*). The Key Award, sponsored by the Elmira College Alumni Association, has been awarded to fine students since 1935. The award of merit is presented to outstanding high school juniors in the top of their class with a minimum cumulative average of 90%. Candidates must also dem-

onstrate school and community leadership.

A Key Award winner receives a \$60,000 tuition scholarship over a four-year period, \$15,000 per year, upon enrolling at Elmira College. The award is renewable each year with an academic average of 3.0 or higher. Recipients attending Elmira College are also honored in the fall of their freshman year by the Alumni Association and are presented with the prestigious Elmira College Key.

Creative Minds Convene for Competition in Wellsville

On Saturday, March 15, 45 teams of elementary, middle, and high school students from across the Southern Tier demonstrated their creativity during the *Odyssey of the Mind* Regional Competition held right here at Wellsville Central School. This worldwide creative problem-solving tournament promotes original and divergent thinking as a team sport. Divergent problems (those

with more than one solution) encourage students to learn and lead using 21st century skills. Working in teams of up to seven members, participants learn teamwork, the appreciation and understanding of others, and the concept that a group is a more powerful thinking force than an individual.

More than 300 creative kids aged 10-18 from 11 area school districts showed off their brain power in this high-energy tournament and Wellsville Central School posted a number of winning teams (*see photos below and on facing page*) in the five divergent problem competitions. Winners will represent Region 19 at the New York State Tournament at Binghamton University on April 12 and possibly World Finals at Iowa State University on May 28-31.





Important Reminder to Seniors (and their parents)!

Seniors, please remember to turn in your **senior data sheets** to the Guidance Office no later than, Tuesday, April 22. Blank senior data sheets are available in the Guidance Office. These sheets are very important to seniors in order to be considered for any local scholarships. If you have any questions concerning these sheets, please see guidance.

More Important Information for Seniors (Class of 2014)

- Complete your senior data sheet carefully and neatly and return it to the Guidance Office by April 22.
- Neatness counts! We cannot overemphasize this point. Write down all of your activities (but be scrupulously honest), and write legibly and neatly in black ink. The **senior data sheet** is how our community's scholarship donors will perceive you. Do not attach pages.
- Scholarship Night is set for Tuesday, June 3. If you are going to receive an award, your parents or guardians will receive a letter. However, all seniors are encouraged to attend.
- Please inform the Guidance Office of your post high school graduation plans, college acceptances, scholarship opportunities, job offers, etc.
 - Check with your chosen college now if you need tuition assistance.
- Please do not count on local scholarships to underwrite a majority of your college costs. These one-time awards may help pay for some books and perhaps a small portion of tuition. You should already have a financial plan in place.
- Do your very best these last few months! Your senior year grades are important. A final transcript will be mailed to your college in early July.

In January, students took a written test and completed a role play. Results from these were then used to determine who will compete at the State Career Conference.





Absentee Ballots


