Reading and Math Diagnostics

This year our school has the privilege of piloting a different diagnostic program to progress monitor our students. In the past we have used iReady for progress monitoring and instruction. This year our student will not be required to complete the iReady assessments or the iReady instructional path. Instead our Kindergarten and some first grade students will be taking the Star Early Literacy, customized reading test for students to take on a computer. The test is designed for students beginning readers who do not yet read independently or need early iteracy skills assessed. Our first through fifth grade students will be taking Star Reading and Star Math, also a customized reading and math test on the computer.

This 15 to 25 minute assessment will be given five times a year to monitor the progress of our students and guide individual instruction for our students. We are excited to be piloting this program that has been used in many other counties for years with much success. Teachers will use reports from Star Early Literacy, Reading, and Math to determine the ability level of each student and to measure growth. There will not be a home computer based component for students to complete at home; so please be on the lookout for other assignments from your child's teacher to help them practice what they learned in school.



As always, we are thankful for your support and involvement in your child's education! Family Reading Experience



All are invited to visit the Title 1 Family Reading Experience (FRE) and check out up to three books. In addition to the weekly check-out books, each child receives one weekly "Keeper" book for their home library. The FRE takes place twice a week, on Tuesday and Thursday mornings from 7:30am—8:30am in the Media Center. Parents, along with Ms. McGill, locate books that are "just right" for each child's reading level.



The Liberty Elementary SPAR, SIP, PIP, School Compact, and Parent's Rights to Know are available in the front office, in the Family Reading Center, and on the Liberty Elementary Website in the upper right hand corner under "Important Links."



What is SOAR? Has your child talked about going to SOAR? At Liberty Elementary we are extremely fortunate to have the additional resource of SOAR: Student Outcome Achieve Results. Students are selected based upon data and receive an additional amount of time for math and/or reading skills. We have three amazing paraprofessionals that work extensively in small group on guided reading and/or math skills. These groups are reevaluated at midterms and at the end of each grading period.



Here at Liberty we take bullying very seriously. Deputy Geraldine Orneas and Mrs. Whaley ensure that all Liberty students have an accurate understanding of what bullying is and what the students should do if they see someone bullying another student. We want the students at Liberty to know that they should always be kind and supportive of one another.

Dear Parent or Guardian:

Our school receives federal funds for Title I, Part A Programs. Throughout the school year, we will be providing you with important information about this Federal Program and your child's education. This letter is to inform you about your right to request information about the qualifications of classroom teachers and staff and, if applicable, Title I tutors working with your child. The process for requesting information:

You have the right to request information regarding the professional qualifications of your child's classroom teacher(s) and/or Title I tutor. If you request this information, the district or school will provide you with answers to the following questions in a timely manner.

- I. Has your child's teacher and/or Title I tutor met state qualifications and licensing and certification requirements for the grade level and subject in which the teacher is providing instruction?
- 2. What are the baccalaureate degree majors and the fields of discipline for any graduate degrees or certificates the teacher holds if teaching out of field?
- 3. Is the teacher working under an emergency or provisional status through which state licensing requirements have been waived?

You also have the right to request information regarding the professional qualifications of the paraprofessional(s) assisting your child's teacher(s). If you request this information, the district or school will provide you with answers to the following questions in a timely manner.

- Is your child receiving Title I, Part A services from a paraprofessional?
- 2. Has the paraprofessional completed at least two years of study at an institution of higher education?
- 3. Has the paraprofessional met a rigorous standard of quality by meeting our state's certification procedure for determining the quality of paraprofessional staff?

If at any time during the school year your student has been taught for four (4) or more consecutive weeks by a teacher or Title I tutor that is not certified and/or qualified, you will be notified by the school.

In addition, you have the right to be provided information on your student's level of achievement on state or school assessments in language arts, mathematics, science, and social studies. This information will be available at your child's school.

If you would like to request this information, please contact your child's school directly. I encourage you to support your child's education and communicate with your child's teacher(s) on a regular basis.



September is Attendance Awareness Month and it is a great time to encourage each Liberty student to become an Attendance Super H.E.R.O (Here, Every Day, Ready, On Time.)

TOTAL ABSENCES



Too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school.

- Missing IO percent (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read.
- Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two every few weeks.
- Being late to school may lead to poor attendance.
- Absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up.

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school – and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, everyday is important. Good attendance will help children do well in high school, college, and at work.
