Talking Time

There are numerous theories as to why children suck their thumbs and why they will not stop. There are fewer suggestion, however, to help children break the habit.

Some infants suck their thumbs even before they are born. The reason for thumb sucking seem to be that it is a natural reflex that makes children feel secure, happy, and restful.

As children get older, thumb sucking may cause problems with the proper growth of the mouth and alignment of the teeth. Children may also develop a lisp. Thumb sucking may prevent the child from learning other ways to cope with stress. A child's social skills are also interfered with, as "non-suckers" may tease and make fun of the children that do.

Here are some suggestions for breaking the habit:

- Wean the child gradually
- Do not fuss, ridicule, or make fun of an older child for thumb sucking. Nagging will only the child feel guilty and may actually encourage the habit to continue.
- Advise friends and relatives to ignore it.
- Offer incentives. Rewards increase the chances that the child will practice a new behavior.
- Allow the thumb sucking at certain times and places for a specific length of time using a kitchen timer. Gradually reduce the time. Reward with hugs and praise.
- Choose a "penalty" for thumb sucking outside of specified times and places. For an example, give your child a roll of nickels and he must give you one each time he slips. At the end of a week, he can keep the remainder.
- Introduce an alternate activity to replace thumb sucking. It should use both hands like basketball, piano, card games, jumping rope, using a fidget spinner.



Controlled Open Enrollment is Right Around the Corner!

This is a friendly reminder from Dr. Desjardins, Assistant Superintendent of School Support Services for Charlotte County Public Schools, alerting parents that the months of February and March are designated as the school district's controlled open enrollment window (school choice). During these months, parents and guardians may select a school in our district other than their child's assigned geographic school for the upcoming 2020-21 school year as long as that school is not closed due to being at capacity enrollment. If a school is "open" to reassignments, it is important to note that your child is not necessarily guaranteed a spot at that location. If there are more reassignment requests for a particular school than available seats, then the district will use a random lottery to determine which students will be allowed to attend that school. If a random lottery is needed, it will be conducted during the first two weeks of April.

Any student who is currently on reassignment to a school other than his or her assigned geographic school is no longer required to renew his or her reassignment every year. Your student will remain on that school's roster until your student has completed the highest grade level offered at that school (5th grade for elementary school and 8th grade for middle school). Out-of-County residents no longer need to renew their reassignment application each year they wish for their student to attend a Charlotte County Public School unless they decide to change the school their student is currently attending.

available Reassignment forms are at any Charlotte County Public School, Charlotte County Public Schools Murdock Center, or on the web at www.yourcharlotteschools.net. A complete listing of schools that are at capacity (closed to reassignments) is also available on the school district's website. If you decide to select a school other than your child's assigned geographic school, be careful to research the special conditions such as athletic eligibility that are attached to reassignment obligations. Transportation is not provided for students who have obtained a reassignment. Out-of-County students no longer need to obtain a signature (release) from their county of residence





Liberty Supports Future Educators

Liberty Elementary welcomes student teachers from Florida Southwestern State College into classrooms. Here we have Mary Murdock, a Practicum 2 student, teaching a lesson on fractions to Mrs. Schmidt's Third Grade Class. Ms. Murdock did a great job preparing for the lesson and keeping the students engaged as they worked through eight math centers solving problems involving fractions.





Accelerated Reader is a program that allows students to earn points for reading and comprehending books. In order to earn points, a student needs to read a book and understand what the book was about. Then log

on to AR using the account provided by their teacher, to take a quiz on the book. Most picture books have 5 questions, and most chapter books have 10 questions. If the student receives a 100% they will earn full points for the book, however if they receive less than a 100% they will receive a portion of the points. Most picture books are worth 0.5 points and chapter books vary in point value based on difficulty. **Quizzes can only be taken at school during school hours**, but we encourage students to read their AR books at home. Kindergarten students will begin taking AR quizzes when they master 100 sight words. You can find out if a book has an AR quiz by visiting www.arbookfind.com.

So how can students celebrate these points?

Each grade level has a point goal to reach by the end of the school year. If they reach that goal, they will earn an AR t-shirt and an ice cream party. As students earn points, they will have opportunities throughout the year to purchase items at the AR store using their points.



Reflex helps students of all levels to develop fluency with their basic facts in addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. Math fact fluency is the quick and effortless (automatic) recall of basic math facts. This makes learning new math skills much more attainable for students.







Students can earn a **Movie and Popcorn party** twice a year if they achieve and maintain 100% fact fluency on Reflex. Students login and practice math facts through colorful interactive video games. Once they have answered enough facts correctly for the day, they will earn a green light. This should be **done at least 3 days per week**.
