
Compound Words - What are they?

A **compound word** is a combination of two or more **words** that create a single unit of meaning. One word often describes the other. i.e. An armchair is a chair with arms.

Printing Options

- Print the cards on cover stock.
 - Pages 3, 4, 5, 6 support learning about compound words.
 - Ask, "What' is a chair with arms?" (Armchair)
 - Ask the child to say armchair. Now say it again but do not say arm. (chair)
 - Ask the child to say basketball. Now say it again but do not say ball. (basket)
 - Print single or double-sided.
 - Pages 7 & 8 provide practice for learning compound words.
 - Print single or double-sided.
 - Page 9 provides more practice and consolidates the learning.
 - Complete the three-piece puzzles.
 - Print one-sided
 - Page 10 Take-home Page









